The other night while blow drying my hair I thought about all the hair-styles I'd worn in my 60 plus years. The frizzy perms and

the bobbed off hair cuts that I despised were definitely a nightmare during my childhood. Finally, when I was about 10, Mom let my hair grow longer.

I can close my eyes and return to my dresser sitting on the vanity seat where Mom and I held our Saturday night ritual; Mother pin curling my hair for church on Sunday. The tools for the ritual were spread out on a doily: comb, brush, hand mirror, and a container with bobby pins.

Facing the mirror, I remember Mom's attention to each curl as I handed her the bobby pins. Finally, the last pin curl set securely in place; she took a scarf from the chest to secure her work. As she tied the scarf around the back of my head

I could smell the fresh crisp scent of springtime. I was all set for bed and to sleep in pins curls all night. Pin curls were much easier to sleep on than brush rollers that came later. How in the world did I ever sleep on brush rollers every night during my teen age years? They were torture.

I relaxed into a feathered pillow as I drifted off to sleep, inhaling the fresh clean scent that permeated the scarf. I thought of how beautiful my hair would look tomorrow.

My comb-out on Sunday morning completed the hair do ritual. As my Mom unlocked the bobby pins, a cascade of ringlets bounced upon my shoulders. She brushed out the tightly wound spirals, blending

them into layers of curls. The bright morning sun peeked through my bedroom window spotlighting the gold highlights in my blonde hair.

My approval of Mom's work generated a smile as wide as the brim on my hat. I slipped on my white cotton gloves and my black patent leather shoes for church. I posed silently for one last second before the mirror to admire Mom's work.

Over the years, memories of our ritual has aged like wine stored for fermenting. As my Mom's child, I knew I was loved. She was a wonderful Mother and loved us all; she never made a difference in us. To be loved is a wonderful thing; but nothing compares to a mother's love and childhood rituals.

October 13-19 is Kentucky Extension Homemakers Week

The Kentucky Extension Homemakers Association (KEHA) is a volunteer organization that works to improve the quality of life for families and communities through leadership development, volunteer service and education. The organization was developed in cooperation with the University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service. Across the state, County Extension Agents for Family and Consumer Sciences work closely with KEHA members and clubs to provide educational programming and coordinate community activities.

Established in 1932, the state organization remains strong with membership totaling 16,000. Programs educate members and general public about topics including: parenting and grand

parenting, fall prevention, couponing, diabetes, ovarian cancer, financial decision-making, art appreciation, empowering women, and effective leadership.

Volunteer service is a strong emphasis in the KEHA. Members annually report more than 600,000 volunteer hours with a value of more than \$10 million dollars to the Commonwealth. Since 1977, the KEHA has actively supported the University of Kentucky Ovarian Cancer Research Fund. Total donations surpassed the \$1 million mark in 2009 and average more than \$40,000 annually.

While much of the work in the KEHA is focused on local communities and state-wide projects, there is also an emphasis on supporting women and families glob-

ally. The KEHA has been a member of the Associated Country Women of the World since 1936 and two members recently attended the ACWW Triennial Conference in Chennai, India. In recent years, the KEHA has provided significant support for the Kentucky Academy, a kindergarten in Adjeikrom, Ghana.

The homemakers here in Estill County have projects and activities going on all year round. They hold monthly meetings, attend monthly leader lessons, attend craft festivals, day trips, participate in county events such as Light Up Rivertown, Farm Field Day, Mushroom Festival, the county fair, fundraisers for Ovarian Cancer Research, and much more.
