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How to kill bamboo

If bamboo shoots have crept over from your neighbor's yard, cut the underground stems that connect each stalk. Then cut stalks to the ground. Water and fertilize the area to cause new growth, then cut down the new growth. Keep doing this until no more shoots come up. This will exhaust the energy stored in the stems underground; without green leaves to photosynthesize and produce new energy, they will no longer be able to send up new shoots. 
