So the term immutable is only used one time in the Holy Scriptures, but it speaks volumes in its context. The word simply means "never changing and always the same." The same term is used of Christ in **Hebrews** 13:8, and it means the same in Hebrews 6:18.

Today I want to deal with two of the unchanging teachings found in the Bible. In **Hebrews 9:27** where it is written, "And as it is appointed unto me once to die but after this the judgment." To some men death may not be feared all that much, but when the judgment is coupled to it, most folks who are unprepared for it tremble at the very thought of this accounting day. II Corinthians 5:10 reveals the scene at the judgment seat of Christ, where the whole world will be gathered together to face the reality of their deeds. It also says here that it will be a day of receiving the rewards of life whether they be good or bad.

Now, the things that I fear most for all people is that the actions of life speak very clear, and my observation is that most seem to be paying not much attention to the reality of death, or of the judgment as well. In Acts 24:25 Paul is speaking unto Felix, and as he reasoned of righteousness, temperance, and judgment to come, Felix trembled, and answered, "go thy way for this time; when I have a convenient season I will call for thee." But it is not recorded that he ever took advantage of a convenient season.

Sadly, men have not changed in that regard over time, because right today many have sicknesses or accidents come their way and during this stressful time they desire to have the comforts that only the saved and obedient souls have, and so they reach out unto them for prayer and security, but sadly, after making great promises to do better the situation may improve or pass, only to have them seemingly to forget all about their promises. So then, one day when they approach Christ's judgment seat with all the knowledge of the days of misspent opportunities will have to be faced.
