Three arrested for drugs after DUI stop

The citation states that other text messages asked Jimmy Duke to sell a few percocet, and he could keep the extra few dollars made from the asking price.

According to the citation, Mills said that he had given Jimmy Duke pills for helping purchase narcotics on a

previous date.

After the vehicle was searched, IPD charged Mills with trafficking in a controlled substance, first offense.

Sarah Reed, 30, with the same Richmond address as Mills, was a passenger in the vehicle.

Sgt. Gross said Reed gave

him permission to search her purse. He stated he found a green pill in the side pocket of the purse, which was identified by Poison Control as oxycodone 15. The citation adds that Reed had a prescription for oxycodone 10mg which were in the proper container.

The officer added that he also found a marijuana grinder/cutter with residue and a package of rolling papers in her purse.

The citation states that Reed failed field sobriety tests and had white residue up her nose.

Reed was charged with public intoxication, drug paraphernalia, possession of a controlled substance, first degree, and a prescription drug not in proper container.

Jimmy Duke was the alias for James Rodney Adams, 46, of Hudson Avenue, Irvine, according to the police investigation.

The citation states that when Adams was texted if he had percocet 10s for sell, he had texted yes. It adds that Mills and Adams ne-

gotiated on a price of \$12 a piece, and Adams had agreed to sell him two.

IPD says Adams told them he did not sell the two pills, because he could not get them.

Adams was charged early on February 19 with trafficking in a controlled substance, first offense.

He was arraigned in Estill District Court that same day where he pleaded not guilty to the charge. He will reappear in Estill District Court on February 26 for a preliminary hearing.

Bail for James Adams was set at \$25,000 cash.

Mills and Reed were also in district court last Wednesday. Mills pleaded guilty to operating a motor vehicle under the influence. He was sentenced to serve 48 hours in jail, and his operators license will be suspended for 90 days.

Reed pleaded guilty to public intoxication and drug paraphernalia.

Both will be back in court on February 26 for a preliminary hearing on their other charges, which are felonies.

Fiscal court to advertise for salt for next winter

Buying salt was the main topic at Monday's fiscal court meeting. With all the snow this winter, the county has been out of salt for three or four weeks.

The fiscal court voted to buy salt through what is called a reverse salt auction. This is the way that salt has been purchased by the county in recent years.

"I think most salt buildings in the state of Kentucky are bare bones," said Judge/Executive Wallace Taylor.

The salt auction won't help with this year's situation. The salt is scheduled to be delivered for next winter.

Taylor said the salt auctions are conducted by KaCo, which lumps several counties together to get a better price on salt.

"We hope it comes in under \$100 a ton this year," Taylor stated.

The magistrates voted to advertise for 1,000 tons.

"That does not mean we have to take it," Taylor stated. "Who knows what the price will be."

He said he did not expect to see \$70 a ton again for several years.

At the beginning of winter, the county had about 200 tons left over from a mild winter in 2013. Because they had advertised to buy 350 tons through a reverse salt auction, that was all the salt the county could get.

Taylor said the bad winter has also taken a beating on the salt spreaders and blades this year. In the late summer,

he said he will be asking the court to replace some of the snow removal equipment.

The county's trucks have also shown wear and tear this winter. Taylor said one day, he had to send a person in their private vehicle to pick up auto parts.

He asked the fiscal court to set a price limit on the purchase of a used 3/4 or 1 ton diesel 4x4 truck.

After some discussion, the magistrates voted for a \$15,000 limit.

Taylor said if the county's "new" truck is a Ford, the snow removal equipment from one of the trucks they are replacing will work on it.

In other action, the court approved an agreement with the state transportation department for drainage structures.

A memorandum was approved for the county clerk to enter into an agreement with the state board of elections. Sherry Fox said her office will now be doing some work the state did previously.

Sheriff Gary Freeman turned over \$67,000 plus in excess fees to the court. They returned the fees to Freeman to use on his payroll.

Seven part-time 911 dispatchers were hired. Taylor said there were several fantastic applicants. Those hired were Heather Philhower, Michael Lewis, Jonathan Stone, Tedra Hunt, Gina Powell, Thomas Dudley, and Joshua McIntosh.

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
