## Recycling center to close to relocate on Old Pike

Estill County Recycling for April 29, at 4:30 p.m. to Center will be moving from Ravenna to the Old Pike in the next few weeks, announced Judge Wallace Taylor at Monday's fiscal court meeting.

He said that during the move, there will be one week when there is no curbside pick-up of recycled items.

He also announced a public open house at Advanced Disposal Landfill on the Winchester Road.

A few years ago, the landfill began burning methane gas to prevent odors.

Last year, the landfill installed a 16 cylinder engine which produces enough electricity for 1,000 homes. Taylor said the landfill plans to add another engine.

He stated that about 130 people, including Senate President Robert Stivers and Senator Mitch McConnell, had visited Bowie Refined Coal on Friday. Taylor estimated the com-

pany will have a \$4 million payroll. This will generate \$50,000 in occupational taxes for the county.

He also stated this business will open up grant opportunities for the county.
