Grand jury indicts woman for starving child under 12

An Estill County woman has been indicted for allegedly starving a child.

The grand jury returned the indictment Tuesday against Lisa A. Wolfe, 54, of 1032 Wisemantown Road, Irvine.

The indictment charges Wolfe with criminal abuse first degree, a Class C felony. If found guilty of the charge, Wolfe can be fined and/or sentenced from five to ten years in prison.

The indictment states that Wolfe intentionally abused a child in her custody by causing serious physical injury through starvation on January 10, 2014.

She was also charged by the indictment with two counts of criminal abuse third degree, a misdemeanor. The punishment for a misdemeanor is a fine and/or up to one year

According to the indictment, Wolfe subjected a child in her care with cruel confinement or cruel punishment on January 10,

The age of the alleged victim(s) was under 12 years old.

The investigation was conducted by Det. Brian Bowman of the Kentucky State

In an unrelated incident, another couple was indicted on two counts of first degree wanton endangerment and two counts of criminal abuse second degree victims uner 12 years old..

The co-defendants in that indictment were Iris Brook, 25, and Joshua M. Cobble, 27, both of 620 Henry White Road, Irvine.

The indictment states that couple created a substantial danger of death or serious physical injury to two children on March 29, 2014.

The investigation was conducted by Irvine Officer John Sturniolo.

Twelve other indictments were returned by the grand jury last Tuesday.

Joseph E. Addison, 35, and Kathryn R. Noble ,29, both of 132 Madison Ave., Irvine, were named as co-defendants in an indictment charging them with two counts of making false statements to prevent reduction of benefit over \$100.

The indictment says the couple failed to report their household income while receiving benefits through the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), formerly known as food stamps. This resulted in an alleged overpayment of \$1,848.00.

The indictment also states they reportedly received \$3,558.96 in an overpayment through Medicaid.

Autumn F. Reed, 37, a homeless man of Irvine, was named in a six-count indictment, Four of the charges against Reed are traffic violations. They are no tail lamps, failure to give an improper signal, disregarding a stop sign, and reckless driving on December 13. Continued on Page 4
