day's council meeting the city has received a small city community block development block grant for \$843,000 to build and renovate the homes.

Bryan Kirby said this was the only project like this that was funded this year in Kentucky. He added the state is getting away from rehabbing individual homes "so we need to hit the ground running."

Ravenna will be advertising for attorneys, surveyors, demo contractors, building contractors, a project administrator, and other needed professionals.

"The block grant is there to pay for everything," Kirby said.

Although the homes will be built free, the homeowners will have a mortgage. Kirby said after five years the mortgage is forgiven.

Kirby added that if a home which was Mayor Estine Tipton announced at Mon-selected for project is vacant now, it will be disqualified. The residents must prove they have lived in the home for the past year.

'We're not going to build eight houses at once," Kirby stated.

He said this allows for local, small contractors to bid on the project. He explained that if all eight new homes were bid at once, a large firm from Lexington or Louisville would be doing the work.

"I should call this the Elm Street project," Kirby stated, because most of the houses to be rebuilt or renovated are on Elm Street.

Property addresses included in the project Kirby said if the bids come in too high, include 302 Holly Street, 303 Elm, 408 Elm, 606 Elm, 715 Elm, 804 Elm, 811 Elm, 801 Poplar, 300 6th Street, and 308 7th Street.

The council then gave first reading to the 2014-2015 budget. The city has budgeted \$288,606 in its general fund, \$15,000 in state road aid, \$500 in the LGEA fund, \$23,000 for the fire department and \$843,000 for the Community Development Block Grant.

Andrew Witt signs with Patriots

Michael Andrew Witt, a 2014 graduate of Estill County High School, signed a letter last Tuesday afternoon to play soccer at the University of the Cumberlands.

Witt said he will be majoring in biology/pre-med at the university this fall. He has started for four years on the high school soccer team, coached by Tim Tipton.

Assistant principal and athletic director Arthur Ballard said that Witt was the captain of the soccer team the last two years. Witt was also named to the All District and All Regional teams the last two years.

Witt's athletic scholarship is worth \$8,000. He also received an academic scholarship to the University of Cumberlands worth \$80,000 over four years.

He has received a \$2,000 Jackson Energy Scholarship, Marcum & Wallace Hospital Dr. Terry Scholarship worth \$500, the US Marine Corps Distinguished Athlete Award, and ECHS 30+ ACT Club award.

Witt was also offered academic scholarships to EKU, MSU, Transylvania University, Lindsey Wilson, UK, and Centre.

He graduated in the top of his class with a 4.6 weighted grade point average. During his junior and senior years at Estill, Witt earned 27 credit hours for college classes.

Ballard said that Witt is the third Estill soccer play to receive a scholarship in recent years. Chris Gill went to Berea, and Matthew Bonny went to the University of Cumberlands.

Colleges are also expressing an interest in two more of Estill's soccer players

Witt started playing soccer with the U-10 league (under 10 years of age). He has played soccer with the Blue Grass Soccer Club in Versailles for the past eight years. His club soccer team was a state semi-finalist this year.

Ballard encouraged Estill's other soccer playing students to work as hard as Witt has.

The University of Cumberlands had an overall record of 8-8-1 last season. The Patriots finished fourth in the Mid American Conference.



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
