# So Many Ways To Prepare Blueberries

10 things which brought me great joy as a youngster, most of them involve pleasures associated with leisure time such as: playing softball, swimming, fishing with a cane pole for catfish with my grandfather, picking berries and picking vegetables in the garden.

Plenty of hard work was involved, but the simple delights of enjoying products of the sweat of one's brow, walking newly hoed rows to look at corn and beans, or seeing a labor of love's end products were delightful.

Gardening was a part of my life as far back as memory goes. Daddy took gardening as a matter of serious concern. Part of this was ne-

cessity...the food produced made a significant difference in the family budget and it is healthier for you.

The ground was first turned in early spring with a plow and harrow but it was hand labor with a hoe and other tools for most of season until everything was harvested. There was always work to be done.

Each step, from planting the first seeds of spring vegetables or putting out onion sets and cutting up seed potatoes right through to the gathering of late beans and after the first frost, was part of the rhythm of life. Some things, such as feeding chickens and slopping hogs, went on throughout the year, but gardening was a March to October deal.

It's been well over 50 years since I first raised my "own" garden. (Daddy let me have a little spot which I worked up with a spading fork). In my mind's eye I can still see those yellow pear tomatoes growing until they matured in mid-August. A few years later when

I was married and in my

twenties I got a bit more ambitious and raised my first full-fledged garden.

As every gardener knows, there are some down times, and it seems most of mine revolve dealing with critters. While we had the normal problems such as blight, Japanese beetles, cut worms, and the like, most major sources of trouble came from deer and squirrels, with occasional intrusions from raccoons and rabbits. We had trouble too with terrapins; I call them ("tarpins"), taking bites out of ripe tomatoes and cantaloupes. Dad instructed me to smash the terrapins.

The case of the bushy tails... we've been working on them with determination. Not only do they play hob with the bird feeders, fruits and vegetables, they also got into the wiring in the Jeep and destroyed all the wires; about three hundred dollars worth of mischief. Therefore, I use my trusty 12 gauge.

Then there are the birds... I love to watch them feed, and we go through a considerable amount of food each

year, along with sweet water for the hummingbirds.

My main bone to pick with the birds focuses on blueberries, blackberries and strawberries. I don't mind sharing but sometimes the birds, and robins, brown thrashers and mockingbirds are the worst, have a different idea of what their share is.

Covering the blue berry bushes with netting helps, but a lot of times the birds still find a small hole and work themselves inside.

There are so many ways to prepare blue berries, There's blue berry pie and cobbler, blue berry pizza, blue berry chutney, blue berry buckle and blueberry salad to name a few.

I experienced genuine pleasure just walking around in the garden and yard with my Dad in the early mornings surveying and harvesting all the vegetables. We talked about the growth of the vegetables and what's biting the potatoes and beans. Every morning spent gave me cherished memories of my Daddy and our gardening experiences.

**Blueberry Salad**  
2 cups blueberries  
1 (six-ounce) package black cherry gelatin  
1 cup water  
1 (8 1/2 ounce) can crushed pineapple, undrained  
1 small carton whipping cream  
1 (3-ounce) package cream cheese, softened  
1/2 cup finely chopped pecans

Place one cup berries in a saucepan, cover with water and simmer until berries are tender. Drain and reserve the juice. Add enough water to the blueberry juice to make two cups. Heat juice to boiling and add gelatin. Stir until gelatin is dissolved. Add one cup cold water, pineapple, cooked blueberries, and a cup of uncooked blueberries. Pour into a 9X13 inch dish and refrigerate until firm.

Beat softened cream cheese, add nuts and fold in whipped topping. Mix well. Spread over congealed salad and chill for at least two hours before serving.

By now most of you in our county have probably noticed the monuments being erected on River Drive, all to the glorification of alcohol sales. Perhaps this article will do little to offset this danger to our city and county, but I hope that it will serve as a warning unto all that might be tempted to indulge in such an activity. Sadly, the old argument that the tax upon such will be of great help to our local economy. To these people I write: "You must have your head buried in the sands of justification research," because it has been clearly noted that for every tax dollar collected from the sale of alcohol it takes seven dollars to offset the results of drinking, such as accidental death for driving drunk. 68% of all fatalities are the result of drinking.
