I was told those were the two liquor stores that were to open since the city of Irvine had voted for the sale of alcohol. I have no ideal when they are to open but it looks like it won't be long.

I have mixed feelings about the sale of alcohol locally. Personally, I'm against it because I believe it causes trouble anyway you look at it. But we all have to make our own personal choices and God gave us that free-

will. I was doing some research on alcohol and found some articles on Prohibition. I'd say not too many are still living that remember it and for those who don't know what Prohibition was; it's the ratification of the 18th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution which banned the manufacture, transportation and sale of intoxicating liquors. It ushered in a period in American history known as Prohibition. It was the result of a widespread temperance movement during the first decade of the 20th century.

Prohibition was difficult to enforce, despite the passage of the Volstead Act. The increase of illegal production and sale of liquor (known as "bootlegging"), the proliferation of speakeasies (illegal drinking spots) and the accompanying rise in gang violence and other crimes led to the waning support for Prohibition by the end of the 1920s.

In early 1933, Congress adopted a resolution proposing a 21st Amendment to the Constitution that would repeal the 18th Amendment. It was ratified by the end of that year, bringing the Prohibition era to a close. But the distillery companies came up with other ideas and products. With the alcohol production coming to a halt precipitated a crisis for a major industry. The companies involved were not exactly surprised, nevertheless, many companies didn't survive and those that did had quite a story to tell.

When the stills closed across the land the alcohol beverage industry turned to inventive alternatives such as "champagne" cider, hard cider, and carbonated soft drinks.

Stephen Martinelli, a student at University of California began experimenting with unfermented apple juice and produced the first unfermented apple juice and the first nonalcoholic sparkling cider.

he Jack Daniels Distillery

was producing whiskey in Tennessee in 1866 and was the first registered distillery in the United States. Uncle Jack, a confirmed bachelor died in 1908 and upon his death the distillery went to his nephew, Lem. Prohibition took effect in Tennessee in 1910; 10 years before the 18th Amendment was passed. During prohibition Lem raised mules, ran a general store and turned Lynchburg into a center for buying and selling of mules.

When Prohibition ended Tennessee remained "dry" and Lem was elected to a seat in the Tennessee legislature and helped pass a bill allowing the manufacture of whiskey in Tennessee, even though it couldn't be sold there.

In 1937 Lem reopened the distillery and went out of the mule business and returned to making whiskey.

The Adolph Coors Company which had been brewing their famous beer in Golden Colorado, using Rocky Mountain water since 1873 were forced to dump 17,000 gallons of beer when the 18th Amendment was passed but the family was prepared to survive by opening a cement manufacturing facility and a porcelain factory. (Today it is called Coors Ceramics. They also produced food products and a near-beer called Mannah, from which the alcohol was removed after fermentation and sent to government-bonded storage to be sold to drug companies and hospitals.

Survival techniques were varied and inventive. The Stroh's Brewery in Detroit went into the ice-cream business. Stroh's ice cream and Martinelli's Sparkling Apple Juice is still made today.
