

What to Preach About? by BOB CASEY, Preacher Church of Christ, 262 Broadway, Irvine, KY

Nearly forty five years have come and gone since I first made an attempt to preach the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ. Most of the people who have heard me make this attempt, know by now that most of my sermons are taken from the New Testament. Does this mean that I do not believe those in the Old Testament, or that they have no place in today's world? Let me assure you that I believe that the Old Testament is so very important, simply because it tells us of man's beginnings, and how that God dealt with their sins, and foretold of their redemption that was to come through the Lord Jesus Christ, His Son and their Savior. Romans 3:24, "being justified freely by his grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus:." Then in Acts 4:12, it says: "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is no other name under heaven given among men, by which we must be saved."

So then, just the simple teachings of these two verses and there are many more, tells us clearly that in the New Testament, Christ is our only Redeemer and that salvation can only be obtained through His name. So again in the New Testament is found the virgin birth, the amazing life of Jesus as He proved by miracles, signs, wonders that He was without doubt the Son of the Almighty.

The very same thing that our Lord preached in Mark 1:15 "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand: repent ye, and believe the gospel."

So today, how good it is to have the assurance of salvation through hearing our Lord, believing in what He has said, changing our minds by repenting, gladly confessing His name before men, and to fulfill our conscience and obedience, being baptized for the remission of our sins. Why are all these things needful? Luke 6:46, "And why call ye me Lord, Lord, and do not the things which I say?" and to include the New Testament truth **Hebrews 5:8-9** "Though he were a son, yet learned he obedience by the things which he suffered; and being made prefect, he became the author of eternal salvation unto all them that obey him." In closing, have you fully obeyed His teaching then you have hope in Him but if you have not obeyed, you no doubt stand in jeopardy right this very moment. Don't lose your soul. Obey the Lord while you have the opportunity.
