## Grand jury returns eight indictments

Eight indictments were returned by the Estill County Grand Jury last Monday, October 20.

These indictments appear as they are numbered in the circuit clerk's office.

John R. Dunaway, 23, of Wall Street, Irvine, was charged with criminal possession of a forged instrument, second degree, promoting contraband, first degree, possession of a con-

trolled substance, first degree, first offense (cocaine), and being a second degree persistent felony offender.

The indictment states that between August 1 and 4 of this year, Dunaway illegally possessed checks belonging to Wavelene Dunaway.

It adds that Dunaway had cocaine in his possession while he was being booked into the Estill County Detention Center for having the

checks.

Those three charges are Class D felonies, punishable by one to five years in state prison.

According to the indictment, Dunaway has been convicted of one prior felony offense.

Deputy Doc Morris was the investigating officer.

Ellen Townsend, 30, of Dark Hollow Road, Irvine, was indicted on a single

charge of fraudulent use of a credit card. This is a Class D felony.

Her indictment states that between March 26 and April 4 of this year, she used Gene Bunch's credit card without his consent to withdraw \$611.00.

Deputy Morris investigated this case also.

Charles Wayne Donahue, 53, of Rockaway Road, Irvine, was indicted for sec-

ond degree assault and three counts of wanton endangerment, first degree.

The assault charge is a Class C felony, punishable by five to ten years in prison, while wanton endangerment is a Class D felony.

Donahue allegedly struck Roger Hall over the head with a 20 gauge shotgun several times on September 30, 2011. Hall was transported to the hospital with injuries.

The indictment states that Donahue pointed a shot gun at Movetta Hall, Rodney Hall, and Alex Brewer and stated he was going to kill them.

The investigating officer was Doc Morris.

Steven Henry, 32, of Lamar Drive, Irvine, was indicted on a single charge of receiving stolen property over \$500, under \$10,000.

## IPD arrests man twice in less than 24 hours

*He violated conditions of bond release*

An Estill man was twice arrested by Irvine Police last week, both times at 236 Rosebud Avenue.

Ricky Westerfield II, 33, of Driftwood Drive, Ravenna, was charged by IPD Officer John Sturniolo around 8 p.m. on October 24 with assault fourth degree, minor injury and disorderly conduct, second degree.

The citation states that Westerfield threw the homeowner at 236 Rosebud to the ground which caused minor injury.

It adds that Westerfield caused public alarm by yelling and using profanity in front of the residence at 236 Rosebud.

Westerfield was released from custody on a bond early on October 25. He went back to 236 Rosebud just before 3 p.m. which violated the conditions of his release earlier in the day.

Officer Sturniolo said Westerfield kicked open the door and entered the residence. He said the accused was yelling and using profanity in the doorway, again causing public alarm.

The officer stated that Westerfield resisted being handcuffed and placed in the police cruiser. He added that Westerfield was highly intoxicated under the influence of drugs.

According to Sturniolo, Westerfield was

out of control in the police cruiser and at the Estill County Jail where he fought with two deputy jailers. The officer stated that Westerfield had to be pepper sprayed.

Westerfield was charged with criminal trespass, first; disorderly conduct, second; public intoxication; violation of conditions of release; menacing; resisting arrest; and criminal mischief, third.

A female was also arrested at the residence along with Westerfield.

Officer Sturniolo said that Meghan Neal, 24, went to 236 Rosebud where she began to argue with her brother. Her address was given as 236 Rosebud.

The female had a bag filled with cigarettes and a cigarette maker/filler. Sturniolo said she swung this bag at her brother and hit him in the neck area where he had had surgery earlier in the week.

The officer said Neal was under the influence. He said she stated she had taken loritab and was not sure of what else.

She also told the policeman that she was pregnant.

Sturniolo charged Neal with assault fourth degree, minor injury; disorderly conduct, second; public intoxication; criminal abuse, third; and illegal possession of a legend drug.

## Tuesday's election makes history for county

Voters in Estill County and all across the state will go to the polls next Tuesday.

The election in Estill County will be a historic one. This is the first time in the county's history that a candidate from the independent party is running for local office. And it's not only one, but two candidates.

James "E" Jim Walters filed to run as an independent candidate for mayor of Irvine back in January.

Walters is challenging W.J. Noland, a republican. The winner will replace the current mayor Ernest Lee

Farmer, who did not run for re-election.

Normally, the mayor's term is a four year one. If residents of both cities vote for the merger, then Irvine's mayor will serve until the merged government goes into effect.

The other independent candidate, Jason "J.D." Riley, did not file for county attorney until August.

The current county attorney, Rodney Davis, had filed for re-election in January. Davis was the only one to file at that time.

Riley switched parties to independent after the Janu-

ary filing deadline for candidates. This enabled him to file for county attorney as an independent candidate before the August deadline for non-partisan races.

A write-in candidate has also registered for constable in District 1. Any write-in votes for Ronnie Means will be counted in next Tuesday's election.

Means filed as a republican party candidate by the January deadline. He finished second to Danny Conrad in the May primary.

Conrad had moved to Madison County but did not withdraw until after the

election. This left a vacancy for the republican party, so Means filed as a write-in candidate.

He is challenging Ricky L Williams, the democratic candidate.

Polls in Estill County will open at 6 a.m. and close at 6 p.m. Anyone with questions about voting can contact County Clerk Sherry L. Fox in her office or at 723-5156.

A voter who will be out of town on election day may qualify to vote early in the county clerk's office.
