A Berea woman has been charged with stated the woman told police that she had endangering the welfare of a child by the Irvine Police Department

The woman's arrest came after the Irvine Police Department was dispatched to the Children's Clinic on River Drive around 1:12 p.m. last Wednesday, January 14. Police were told the woman had an eight month old boy baby with her and was possibly under the influence.

Captain Adrian McKinney said when he arrived at the pharmacy, the woman was leaning on the counter. The baby was in a child carrier, which was sitting on the counter next to the woman.

The police officer said the pharmacist said the woman had been sitting in a chair gan Lee Neil, 29, of Berea with endanand passing out. She added the woman had almost fallen to the floor while she was standing at the counter.
