said, "I think it's warm enough to take the stove down."
No sooner were the words spoken, I ran for the newspapers we had been saving to catch the soot. It created a mess. We covered everything in the room, but you still had soot.
We got a kitchen chair to set in front of the flue to reach the stovepipe. We had two coal buckets. Mom stepped up in the chair and began loosening the stovepipe joints. She removed the first joint, handed it to me and I ran to the backyard and shook the soot from pipe getting it all over

me. I made about three trips with three joints but by that time I had quite bit of soot on me.
I climbed up in the chair and placed the flue cover over the flue hole. It looked so much prettier with the flowers on it.
Next we lugged the stove out to the back porch and Dad took it the barn on the tractor carry--all to store for the summer.
The room looked so much so bigger with stove gone. Now we were ready to house clean. Seems like Mom became a white cleaning tornado in the spring, especially after we

took down the stove.
We began taking up all the throw rugs, took curtains down, washed and pinned to curtain stretchers, and them left to dry.
Walls, windows and wood work was washed or painted; hardwood floors were cleaned, polished and shined with Johnson paste wax, on our hands and knees.
The furniture was cleaned and polished, summer linens were placed on the beds, and the curtains were hung, we cleaned the front porch furniture, and I dropped into swing. WE were ready for summer.

Examples - Traditions - Customs by BOB CASEY Preacher Church of Christ

Just recently I was accused of being motivated by tradition concerning the Lord's day activities for every Christian. Now I will tell you that I have a good challenge when it comes to the teachings of the word of God. Paul said in **I Thessalonians 5:21**, "Prove all things, hold fast to that which is true." In my discussion with the young man, the topic was, "Is it perfectly legal in God's sight to hold a meeting of the church, anytime during the Lord's Day? Now I grant you this, there have been times that because of inclement weather that the assembly was delayed for two hours waiting for the snow to be removed off the highways. One time we had to wait until 2 o'clock in the afternoon to meet. But this was not the normal time of the meeting for church.
What does the Bible teach?
Since biblical examples are set by traditional activities of the church since the very first century, then customs do matter when it comes to church activity time.
No one I know of, except the adventist, meet each Sunday, commonly called the Lord's Day in the Bible. And why was this an acceptable day? First, all four of the gospels, record our Lord's resurrection upon the first day of the week. So there is no argument concerning that day. Notice this, the traditions of men were denounced by Christ when they were against the real law of God (**Matthew 15**). Paul encouraged the church in **II Thessalonians 2:15** saying: "Therefore brethren, stand fast, and hold the traditions which ye have been taught, whether by word, or our epistles."
The Bible teaches in **Acts 2:15** that the apostles having been instructed by Jesus, and filled with the holy spirit were preaching at **nine o'clock in the morning**. Then in **Acts 3:1** the apostles were keeping traditional customs when they were entering the temple in the house of prayer, being nine o'clock in the morning.
Adrian Clark, being one of the most studious Bible teachers we have had for several centuries said of these passages, "The third hour of the day, this is about what the time of nine o'clock in the morning previously, to which the Jews scarcely ever ate or drank water, for that hour was the hour of prayer." This custom appears to have been so common (tradition) that even the most in temperament among the Jews were not known to transgress it. So this custom is, and has been kept by the church for 2,000 years. How can one say that traditions do not amount to any thing?
Thereby established customs do matter, for they share enthusiasm, direction, love of the brethren, love of Bible study, and preaching of the gospel.
So when anyone would disobey established customs, they will be showing a lack of love to the church, disobeying enthusiasm, and may be only to demonstrate a trait of Diastophes in **III John 9**, thereby only wishing to establish a veil of pre-eminence among the people who will hear it. This ought never to be!
