Weekly Irvine Police Activity

• Duke A. Brinegar, 40, of Wisemantown Road, Irvine was arrested April 16 at 604 Poplar Street on a single charge of disorderly conduct, 2nd degree, by Sgt. Mike Gross. The citation states that Gross was requested to back up the constable in District 1, Ricky Williams, to assist with a domestic in progress. Upon arrival, Sgt. Gross said that Brinegar was standing between two houses, and he was screaming, cursing, and threatening the neighbors. The citation states that Brinegar refused to comply with multiple requests to calm down and quit screaming.

• Stephen R. Shifflet, 24, of Richmond, was charged with driving under the influence on April 19 by Officer John Sturniolo. The officer stated Shifflet's vehicle failed to stop for a red light at Carhart Ave. After stopping the car, the officer said he smelled alcohol on Shifflet, who admitted to drinking four beers and Jagermeister.

Officer Sturniolo said that Shifflet failed field sobriety tests and registered 0.088 on a breathalyzer. The officer added that Shifflet had slurred speech and was unsteady on his feet.

• Adam Gould, 25, of Stephens Ave., Irvine was cited April 19 for possession of marijuana and drug paraphernalia by Officer Karl Rifenbark. The officer went to Gould's residence because of a verbal dispute. When he arrived, he said Gould's girlfriend handed him a brown box with paraphernalia and a small bag of marijuana inside. The girlfriend told Rifenbark that Gould would not stop using the marijuana. The officer said Gould told him the paraphernalia and marijuana belonged to him.

• Travis L. Gordon, 76, of Cantrill Street, Irvine was cited for wanton endangerment, first by Captain Adrian McKinney on April 18. The citation states that Gordon's neighbor was mowing his yard and the yard between him and Gordon. Gordon went out

onto his back porch and told the neighbor he had blown grass clippings on Gordon's vehicle. Gordon allegedly pointed a small silver gun at the neighbor and said he would shoot him.

Capt. McKinney said when he knocked on Gordon's door, Gordon answered the door and had a pistol in his hand which matched the description.

• IPD Police Chief Brad Smith cited Timothy Puckett, 27, of Broadway, Irvine with public intoxication of a controlled substance, drug paraphernalia, and fleeing or evading police, second degree (on foot).

The chief said that he passed Puckett standing beside a parked vehicle while he was patrolling Broadway. He said that Puckett began to walk away suspiciously. Smith said he circled the block and noticed Puckett

hiding behind a building. The chief stated that Puckett immediately began running when he saw the chief's cruiser. He was located shortly afterward inside a nearby residence.

The chief stated that a search of Puckett turned up a used needle and a small pill container. He added that Puckett's speech was slurred and his pupils were pin-pointed. Puckett allegedly admitted to taking percoset prior to his arrest.

• A Madison County bench warrant was served April 15 by Chief Smith on Dustin D. Reynolds, 21, of Ticky Fork Road, Ravenna. The warrant states that Reynolds failed to appear in Madison District Court on charges of possession of a controlled substance, first degree, first offense; theft by unlawful taking or disposition shoplifting un-

der \$500, criminal mischief third degree, possession of burglary tools, and drug paraphernalia. Judge B. Brown set Reynolds' bond at \$2,500 cash.

• A criminal complaint was served April 20 by Chief Brad Smith on Kevin Richardson, 39, of Pea Ridge Road, Irvine on charges of fourth degree assault (minor injury) and criminal mischief, third degree.

The criminal complaint was obtained by Ryan Brown, who says that on April 1 of this year, Richardson choked him and hit him in the leg with a golf club. He added that Richardson grabbed his cell phone and caused its screen to crack.

Brown stated that he had swelling to his neck and bruising and soreness to his leg. The complaint adds that Brown's cell phone also received \$600 in damages.

In past years, it has taken a year or longer before the county receives reimbursement for disasters.

Taylor said the county currently owes \$248,000 in long term debt, which is down from \$1.8 million when he became judge/executive.

Fire Chief Derrick Muncie gave the quarterly fire report. He stated there were five structure fires, all occurring when there was snow on the ground. Because of extreme weather, it took the fire department 36 minutes to arrive at one structure fire. He also said there was one run, that the fire department could not respond to, apparently because of flooded roads.

Muncie said there were no fires when the county was without water.

The fiscal court also agreed to apply for other grants. If received, a Hazardous Waste Management Grant will allow for residents to turn in dangerous chemicals during a one-day event. Taylor said a recycling grant will allow for the purchase of a trailer, tarp, and additional recycling bins.

Sealed bids will be advertised for the purchase of health insurance and asphalt. Bids will also be received on a surplus tower.

Budgets for fiscal year 2016 were received from the conservation district, Chamberlain Branch watershed, and the extension district.

As vehicle leaves roadway, tire comes off into path of another vehicle on road

Two vehicles were involved in a collision Sunday afternoon on Millers Creek Road, about a mile from Ravenna.

Deputy Russell "Doc" Morris investigated the 1:52 p.m. wreck, about a mile east of Ravenna.

Anthony Delishio of Stanton told Deputy Morris that he tapped the brakes of his vehicle, a 2003 Ford Expedition.

He added that when he tapped the brakes, it caused his vehicle to slide into a telephone pole on the right side of the road.

The impact with the phone pole caused


the front wheel to come off and roll down the roadway.

The runaway tire was then struck by a 2007 Ford Focus driven by Minnie Ginter of Hoyes Fork Road, Irvine.

One of Delishio's two passengers, Dakota Delishio, received minor injuries. He was transported to Marcum & Wallace Hospital for treatment.

Neither Ginter nor her passenger reported injuries.

The Expedition was moderately damaged at the front while the Ford Focus received very minor damages to the front.
