Hunters love to turkey hunt, but who stops to think, where did they come from? Worse than that how many belong to the organization that got them here. I often think, how many hunters in Estill County even think about a "Slam", or are you satisfied with just getting the Eastern turkey every year. Fellow Hunters, "think outside the box". I hunt all over the United States, Canada, and Mexico; in my opinion, every hunter needs to try that. Remember, we just go

I will head to Mexico this May, to try for my "Royal" slam. I would love to look around the lodge and see someone who says "I am from Estill County." You think that will happen, or only in my dreams. Lady Engineers will play in 56th District championship

The Estill County Lady Engineers earned a spot in the 56th District Championship on Thursday night and are assured of a berth in the 14th Region Tournament after winning 56-53 over the host Powell County Pirates on Monday night in Stanton.

The two teams each finished 3-3 in the district and each had won one game over the other, but Powell County was seeded #2 after winning over Estill in their first regular season game by six, 52-46. The Lady Engineers got the second win but by only four, 52-48.

Monday's game was close with the Lady Pirates threatening to the final seconds, but the Lady Engineers held on for the win.

Estill's ladies will be playing on Thursday night, also in Stanton, against the top seeded team in the 56th District, the Owsley County Lady Owls.

The Lady Owls finished 7-0 in district play and easily dominated the Lee County Bobcats for the third time this season to win 63-15, also on Monday night in Stanton.

Owsley won both matches this season against Estill. The Lady Owls bested the Lady Engineers by 20, 74-54, in December in Booneville; then won by 13, 47-34, in a rematch in January in Irvine.

This time, Estill senior Kaylee Riddell will back healthy for the Lady Engineers, and several younger Estill players continue to improve.

In the most notable of recent games, the Lady Engineers only lost by five to Montgomery County last Thursday at home, 58-53, after having lost by 37 to the Lady Indians in the Gateway Classic in December.

Three players were in double figures against Montgomery County, including 8th grader Sarah Baker and freshman Haley Angel (13 each) and sophomore Mia Hale with ten. Haley also got 13 rebounds against the Lady Indians.

Estill plays at 7:00 p.m. at Stanton against the Lady Owls on Thursday night. Pack the stands to support this excellent group of young ladies.

Engineers likely also in championship with another win over Lee, Tuesday

The Estill County Engineers will also likely be in the the boys 56th District championship to be played on Friday night in Stanton.

Estill was playing Tuesday night in their tournament opener against the Lee County Bobcats, a team they had beaten easily twice in regular season.

The Engineers won first by 17, 70-53 at home on the 17th; then traveled to Beattyville only three days later where they beat Lee County by 39, 81-42.

Several non-starters saw action in this one and substitute Kenny Rose was able to add 11 points, along with scoring by the usual suspects.

The highlight of the week for Estill was a game on Saturday against the 14th Region's top team, the Hazard Bulldogs, where Estill fell by one, 41-40, with no time left.

The Engineers came back to tie the game at 40-all, but Hazard got the last shot attempt, which missed, but a foul was called at the buzzer giving them a shot at the win from the free throw line. It took their second shot for the win while Estill players and fans watched.

Sophomore Landon Napier scored 19 and senior Joe Benton got 13 in the heroic effort against the homestanding Bulldogs on Hazard's senior night.

Earlier, Estill won 75-59 over Menifee County with Benton dropping in 30 points. Junior Will Isfort got 18 and Dyllon Long had 13.

Owsley and Powell County were also playing Tuesday night for a berth in Friday's championship of the 56th District. Those teams were tied 3-3 in regular season district standings. Owsley beat the Pirates 56-46; then Powell beat the Owls by 15, 67-52 in a rematch.

Estill had beaten both Owsley and Powell twice in regular season to win the season title and #1 seeding with a 6-0 district record. Despite the wins, vou can never underestimate the Pirates nor the Owls at tournament time.

If the Engineers won over Lee County on Tuesday night, Estill will return to Stanton on Friday where they will take on either Owsley or Powell on Friday night at 7:00 p.m. and the Pirates' gym will be rocking with Estill's cheerleaders and band leading the cheers.
