Regional 4-H camps are open to all Kentucky youth between the ages of 9 and 14 and provide opportunities for personal growth, gaining independence, fostering friendship skills, learning about Kentucky's natural resources and just having fun.

Many exciting activities and adventures await 4-H campers. Youth can spend their days participating in activities such as swimming, canoeing, high and

Camper safety is a priority at 4-H Camp. Each camp has been accredited by the American Camp Association since 2005, and all staff and volunteers are trained and undergo background checks prior to camp. 2020. Applications are due by Friday, May 8th, but camp is filled on a first come, first serve basis. Therefore, it could be filled before the deadline. The cost for a camper ages 9-15 to attend camp is \$60. This includes a \$25 non-refundable deposit that is due when the application is turned

into the Extension office. There are scholarships available and applications for scholarships are due by April 17th. Scholarship applications are included inside of the 4-H Camp application.

In order to be able to attend 4-H Camp, we are required to also bring along junior and adult counsel-

ors. Junior counselors are individuals ages 16 and 17 whereas adult counselors are individuals ages 18 and above. There is no cost associated with attending 4-H Camp as a junior or adult counselor. For more information about 4-H Camp, contact the Estill County Cooperative Extension Office at


