This photo has been floating around on Facebook, and different versions of it are on Ancestry.Com. Someone titled it, "Three Generations of the Rogers Family," and it includes Hezekiah Rogers, one of many children of William and Abigail Lar-rison Rogers, his son, Jasper Newton Rogers, and JN's sons and wives. Based on the age of Marcus David Rogers, front center, the photo was likely made around 1917. Left to right, from front, are: Hezekiah Rogers (1838-1913), his wife, Rebecca Jane (Barnett), Jasper Newton Rogers, Marcus David Rogers, JN's wife, Mary Jane (Bryant), James Rogers and his first wife, Cal-lie (Wright) who died in 1926. Back row, Hubert Rogers, Fielden Rogers, his wife, Lula Mae (Ab-ney) Rogers, Unknown, Simon Hezekiah Rogers and unknown, possibly William Albert Rogers. JN Rogers' family was photographed earlier and is shown below.



Jasper Newton Rogers and family

This photo of Jasper Newton Rogers' family was made in the late part of 1906 according to the age of the baby in the lap of JN's wife, Mary Jane (Bryant) Rogers. The couple had six sons and one daughter, Lucinda, who is the baby in the picture. Lucinda was born April 9, 1906 and died at the age of six on November 11, 1912. There are six sons, five of which are pictured and listed clockwise from the front center, William Albert, Hubert, Simon, Fielder, and James. The sixth son, Marcus David, was born later. No identification is given for the elderly man in the back but it may be Mary Jane's father. A ten-year-old girl, Nannie Bryant, lived with the Rogers family in 1920 and according to Margaret Winburn Pitts, it was her mother who was raised by the Rogers family and married Tracy Winburn.

Mercy Health Opens Chronic Disease Management Clinic

Mercy Health - Marcum and Wallace Hospital has made a significant investment in the health of the community with the opening of a Chronic Disease Management Clinic (CDM) Clinic. The CDM Clinic seeks to empower, educate and treat patients of all ages with chronic health conditions including: Hepatitis C, diabetes, COPD, congestive heart failure and atrial fibrillation. According to the CDC, a chronic disease is defined as conditions that last one year or more and require ongoing medical attention or limit daily activities of living or both.

The CDM Clinic will have a nurse practitioner, Keith Everitt, APRN, and pharmacist, Trevor Freeman, PharmD, available to assist patients in reaching their goals. Examples of education provided include: controlling blood sugar, learning how to properly use an inhaler and taking medication at the appropriate time and with or without food. Patients of the CDM Clinic will also have access to hospital services such as a Certified Diabetes Educator and Physical Therapist.

Any patient can access the CDM Clinic. The clinical team will work with the patient's primary care provider in a team approach to healthcare. Patients will still see their primary care provider regularly, while also benefiting from the education provided by the CDM Clinic.

"Chronic diseases are among the leading causes of death in the United States; but with education and medication management, it can become easier to achieve health goals," said Marcum and Wallace Hospital President Trena Stocker. "Improving the health and well-being of our community is at the center of the hospital's mission. This clinic extends our capabilities to meet patients where they are in their disease management journey."
