Steve Brewer's "dream came true," by bagging this Gould turkey in Mexico which completed his "Royal Slam," meaning getting one each of the six different wild turkey breeds including, the Eastern (from here), the Rio (midwest), the Merriam (Wyoming), the Osceola (Florida), the Ocellated (Central America), and now the Gould.

I had spent a restless night after my first full day of hunting, thinking about the black bear encounter, and the lack of any activity from the Gould turkey that I was hunting, neither hearing any nor seeing anything. I heard a quiet hum and knew the generator that ran the camp was running and that it would soon be lights on. I noticed my watch, 4am, breakfast would be at four-thirty; we would leave camp at 5am, heading back into the desert for our second full day of hunting.

I noticed my guide had packed more water and snacks than the day before which told me we could be in for a long day. The Ram 2500 roared from camp, it was 5am sharp. After about an hour drive, we parked and exited the truck.

Gerardo hit his call, and two gobblers answered at once, one from the north, the other from the south. Gerardo set me up, and the one to the north was answering every call. The one to the south not so much, he stopped about five minutes in. The one to the north kept coming, but we picked up the chatter of hens. Within a few minutes the hens carried him off, so we moved on.

After walking for what seemed an hour, running and gunning Gerardo put down his call, but I told him, "hit it again," I thought I had heard a gobble. Sure enough, we confirmed that a gobble came from straight ahead, the time was eight thirty.

We walked about a couple hundred yards, and the gobbling was wide open from several gobblers. We were in a tight spot as we saw six long beards round a curve directly in front of us, strutting and gobbling wide open. They was heading straight to us. I knew they would be looking for the hen that never existed. It is hard enough to fool one set of eyes, let alone six. Sure enough, the lead bird spotted something he never liked and started running. I pulled the trigger, feathers flew, but he kept running. My second shot never slowed him either. I then drew down on the second turkey; one shot, he was gone.

I reloaded at this point. Gerardo never stopped calling, and although I was beginning to doubt myself, hunting with a strange shotgun that they provided, I knew failure was not an option. I drew a tight bead on the third turkey, squeezed the trigger, and down he went. It was like a burden was lifted from me. I was in a daze, my guide shaking my hand, my much sought after Gould turkey flopping on the ground, and my "Royal Slam" now in the record books.

For years I have said, "I live a life bigger than a dream." That day, my dream came true. Please think outside the box, and follow your dreams, they will come true.
