2 Chronicles 22:,2-4, "Forty and two years old was Ahaziah when he began to reign, and he reigned one year in Jerusalem. His mother's name also was Athaliah the daughter of Omri. He also walked in the ways of the house of Ahab :for his mother was his counsellor to do wickedly. Wherefore he did evil in the sight of the LORD like the house of Ahab :for they were his counsellors after the death of his father to his destruction."

Ahaziah was king at the age of forty two. He was no child and in forty two years he should have learned a few things.
