The Engineers steam rolled past Letcher County Central 11-2 on Monday in semi-final action to advance to the 14th Region championship game against the 28-12 region leading Hazard Bulldogs.

Estill started early as Andrew Elam singled on a 2-0 count, scoring one run in top of 1st inning. Estill added four runs in the 4th inning. Thomas Forehand, Rocky Hix and Kamden Powell each drove in runs during frame.

Estill struck again in the 5th, Powell singled in Tye Niece, and Forehand doubled off the left center fence to score Powell and Waylon Puckett, and Hix followed up with a single to score pinch runner Tyler Brewer.

The Engineers added 2 more runs in the 7th as Coben Clem scored on a wild pitch and Niece scored on a sac fly by Powell. Forehand threw 7 pitches to seal the deal in bottom of 7th and Estill plays another day!

Lucas Flynn was credited with the win going 5.3 innings, 2 runs on five hits, striking out 5. Thomas Forehand threw one and two-thirds innings in relief out of the bullpen. Forehand recorded the last five outs on 12 pitches to earn the save for Engineers. Little took the loss for Letcher County Central.

Estill racked up 14 hits led by Niece 3, Forehand, Elam, Waddel. Forehand and Elam had 3 RBI each.
