Woman charged in connection with stolen cars

A woman, who was a passenger in two wrecks in October, has been charged with receiving stolen property in connection with those cars, because they were reported as stolen.

The second wreck claimed the life of the driver, Scotty "Scooter" Slawson, 29, a former Irvine resident. That wreck occurred in Walker County, Georgia, south of Chattanooga, TN on October 9.

Slawson's passenger, Crystal Marie Hatton, 32, of Ridge Road, Irvine received minor injuries. She was treated and released, but was arrested the same day in Georgia.

She has been identified as Slawson's girlfriend. Hatton was arrested November 16 by Irvine Officer John Sturniolo on a warrant

parked on the shoulder of the road.

obtained by IPD Captain Adrian McKinney. She was charged with two counts of receiving stolen property under \$10,000 (vehicles).

The warrant states that a witness saw Hatton in a 2000 Chevy Cavalier on October 2, that had been stolen that day from Ran Richardson's Auto Sales on River Drive.

The vehicle was seen driving at a high rate of speed on River Drive and turning onto Turner Avenue.

The car left the left side of the road and the unknown driver over-corrected. The car then traveled to the right side of the road and struck a vehicle which was legally

The driver backed up the Cavalier and

from the scene but the vehicle stalled due to extensive damages.

The male driver and a female passenger fled the scene on foot.

The warrant states that Hatton was also identified as the passenger in a second vehicle stolen that night from Ran Richardson Auto Sales, a 1996 Toyota Avalon.

The vehicles were valued at approximately \$2,000 each.

Bail for Hatton was set at \$2,500 cash. Court records say that she was arrested on a new offense while a case was pending.

Two bench warrants were served on Hatton from Estill District Court for alcohol intoxication and public intoxication. District Judge William Bo Leach signed the war-

turned the car around. He attempted to drive rants because he said that Hatton failed to appear to be arraigned on the alcohol intoxication charge and failed to pay a fine of \$288 on the charge of public intoxication.

A fugitive warrant from Madison County was also served on Hatton on Nov. 16.

The warrant was issued by Madison District Judge Charles Hardin. Hatton had failed to appear in court on charges of theft by unlawful taking and contempt of court. Both charges are misdemeanors, and Judge Hardin set her bond at \$500 cash.

Fayette County District Court Judge M. Thornton had also issued a fugitive warrant for Hatton. He said she had failed to appear in court on a shoplifting charge. Judge Thornton set her bond at \$250 cash on that charge.
