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Man briefly escapes from custody after assaulting officer

An Irvine man is charged with escape after running away from an Irvine Police struggling to take him to the Officer on Thursday evening.

Officer Aaron Curtis was responding to a call about an intoxicated man climbing fences and going through backyards people's on Broadway.

The officer said he came in contact with Timothy L. Bishop, 22, of Noland Court, Irvine at the U.S. Bank, and portedly surrendered and he had been drinking and crossing through people's Bishop continued to be exyards.

The citation states that Bishop had slurred speech, bloodshot eyes, and was unsteady on his feet.

Bishop reportedly had a opened pint of whiskey in his cargo pants pocket.

The officer said after Bishop was placed under arrest, he became very loud and cursed him in front of several people sitting on the porch across the street.

He added that Bishop became very combative on the way to the jail. When Curtis opened the cruiser door at the jail parking lot, he said Bishop got in his face and began cursing him again.

He took Bishop by the arm to escort him in to the jail, but he said the man began pulling away.

Officer Curtis said he grabbed Bishop and began ground where he could hold him until jail staff could as-

The citation states that Bishop began to actively fight the officer. Then he escaped and ran about oneeighth mile back toward the U.S. Bank where he was met by jail staff.

At this point, Bishop re-Bishon admitted to him that was taken back into custody

Officer Curtis said that tremely verbally combative to him and was restrained again inside the jail.

Bishop was charged with alcohol intoxication in a public place (first and second offense), menacing, assault third degree of a police officer or probation officer, resisting arrest, escape third degree, and fleeing or evading police, first degree (on foot).

Bishop was arraigned in Estill District Court on Friday. He pleaded not-guilty to all six charges made against him. Because of two felony charges, a preliminary hearing is scheduled for July 15. The felony charges are the assault of a police officer and fleeing or evading police.

His bail has been set at \$10,000 cash.
