Two cars are struck during KSP pursuit

Irvine man now faces over 20 charges

An Irvine man faces over 20 charges after a high speed pursuit by Kentucky State Police Saturday evening.

Trooper J. Northern wrote in the citation that Almus Chapman, 66, of Geneva Avenue, passed him while going 87 mph on the Joseph Proctor Bypass. He added that Chapman begin to drive faster and was pulling away from him. Northern said he was going approximately 120 mph.

When the trooper topped the bypass hill just before the KY 89 intersection, he said that Chapman passed seven vehicles in the wrong lane and failed to give a turn signal as he turned right on KY 89 toward downtown Irvine.

He said that Chapman failed to stop at the intersection, which had a red light for his lane of travel. When Chapman had passed the seven vehicles, his car struck two of them, a red one and a white one. Trooper Northern said this caused minor damage to Chapman's front passenger side bumper and broke the side mirror on the passenger

Trooper Northern said that Chapman also passed Trooper Scott, who got a partial license plate number. The second trooper also observed the vehicles that were struck.

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Fiscal court continues to support Hollowood but voice disapprovals

There were mixed reactions at Monday's fiscal court meeting about Hollowood Park, a multi-county recreational trail.

Tony Tipton, project manager of Hollowood, said the three other counties, Lee, Powell, and Wolfe, had paid their share, \$18,500, of the lease-to-own agreement.

Members of the Estill Fiscal Court said that when they committed to the park three years ago, they thought it was going to open up the next year.

"I'm quite disappointed it's not up and running," stated Judge Executive Wallace Taylor.

Tipton said the anticipated opening is spring of 2017. He hopes that next year the park can pay its lease.

He stated that a similar park at Rush in Boyd County recently had 20,000 people for a weekkend. Each tourist is estimated to spend \$65 a day, which is \$1 million for the weekend.

Susan Hawkins said she does not see how the trail will benefit Estill County because there is no trail hub here.

Tipton said the majority of Hollowood Park is in Es-

Public hearing on Tenorm is planned for mid-November

Tenorm dumped at Advanced Disposal during 2015 will be scheduled for mid-November and hosted by Concerned Citizens of Estill County (CCEC).

The purpose of the hearing is for the Energy and Environmental Cabinet (EEC) and Cabinet for Health and Family Services (CHFS) to answer questions that citizens may have.

Several members of CCEC met recently with the two state cabinets.

"They're not going after the landfill. They're going after Corey Hoskins and Fairmont Brine," said Mary Cromer, attorney for CCEC from the Applachian De-

fense Center. The state agencies could

A public hearing on the file lawsuits against Hoskins and Fairmont Brine of West Virginia in either their own Administrative Office of Court or Franklin Circuit Court.

> Cromer mentioned the 47 loads of Tenorm brought to the local landfill is now actually 90 loads.

> The state agencies have said that during their investigations they did not find that the landfill had benefitted financially. The landfill had charged only \$30 a ton for the disposal of the Tenorm.

In place of a lawsuit with the landfill, Cromer said the state agencies are asking Advanced Disposal to provide supplemental environmental projects to benefit Estill County.

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
