

KSP arrest man after high speed chase

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The citation states that when Chapman made the right turn, he was not able to keep sight of him due to speed of Chapman's vehicle and entering city limits. He stated that he lost sight of the vehicle at the Family Dollar on Winchester Road.
An officer from the Irvine Police Department was responding to assist state police when a pedestrian walked up to the officer and said a black corvette had turned up Ge-

neva Ave. and identified the driver as Chapman.
When the trooper went to Chapman's home on Geneva Ave., the car was parked around back. The citation states that Chapman's son and children were in the yard. Northern said he was unable to make contact with Chapman. The son said his father told him that he was not going back to jail and was afraid his father would hurt the trooper.
Another brother came

and went inside the house. Chapman came out and told the trooper he was driving the corvette. He then asked Northern if he was the trooper that Chapman had passed on the bypass.
Chapman consented to a blood test.
He was charged with speeding 26 mph or greater, fleeing or evading police, first (motor vehicle), failure to report traffic accident, leaving scene of accident - failure to render aid or assistance (2

counts), improper passing (7 counts), disregarding traffic control device, failure to or improper signal, careless driving, operating a motor vehicle under the influence, reckless driving, wanton endangerment first degree, wanton endangerment first degree - police officer, criminal mischief third degree, and failure to produce insurance card.
Bail for Chapman was set at \$20,000 cash.

Fiscal Court Meets

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He announced the county was in the final round of a grant for a vocational school.

Public meeting to be scheduled on Tenorm

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If the landfill is fined, the money will go to the state's Heritage Land Conservation Fund and those monies will be used to fund projects statewide. Money from the fund was used to purchase the Lily Mountain Nature Preserve in Estill County a few years ago.
One of the alternate projects is to install radiation detectors at the landfill.
Cromer said the other landfill in northeastern Kentucky which took some Tenorm had radiation detec-

tors. What showed up too high on their detectors was brought to Estill County.
One of the highest readings of the Tenorm which left Fairmont Brine was 2000 picocuries/gram. Cromer said the state is assuming that all of the Tenorm was at the level. Above 5 picocuries/gram is considered high.
Another suggestion for an alternate project is radiation mitigation at the high school and middle school.
CCEC was told that Ken-ny Cole, environmentalist at the Estill County Health De-

partment, had conducted radon tests in the two schools over fall break. Those tests were in the normal range.
CCEC members are wanting to think of other alternate projects for the landfill, possibly in place of the mitigation at the schools because of the normal readings.
A steep hill behind the middle school does have a high rating, but one member said they were unsure how it could be mitigated.
The landfill is working on a remediation plan to

submit to the state agencies.
Advanced Disposal recently started selling stock on the New York Stock Exchange. As of CCEC's meeting, they had sold 19.2 million shares.
Lee County, one of the customers at Blue Ridge RDF, will be taking their garbage to Rumpke in Mt. Sterling. They received a five-year bid at Rumpke.
Members of CCEC say whatever happens in Estill County will set a precedent for the entire state on the disposal of Tenorm.

Bike rider faces charges

A Ravenna man faces numerous charges after threatening to kill a police officer and four workers in the emergency department at Marcum & Wallace Memorial Hospital on Friday.
IPD Captain Adrian Mc-Kinney said he first observed the man on a motorcycle passing a vehicle in the turning lane on River Drive on Oct. 7.
The captain said as the man passed him, he activated his emergency equipment. The man was looking backwards to see if McKinney had turned the lights on him. While doing so, the captain said the man went again into the passing lane and almost into the oncoming lane of traffic.
McKinney said the rider turned onto Oak Street and accelerated at the intersection of Oak and Broadway. He dumped the motorcycle and started to run on foot, but did not.
The Irvine officer stated the man would not follow directions or cooperate with the officers. He reportedly took a step toward Officer John Sturniolo and attempted to spit or blow into his face. Sturniolo pushed the man backward and told him he was under arrest.
McKinney said the man had to be sprayed so officers could regain control.
In route to the jail, McKinney said the man stated that if he went to prison, that McKinney would know about it.
McKinney said as he was removing the man from the cruiser at the jail, the man turned on him and attempted a head butt. McKinney said he shoved the man back. The man fell backwards and hit his head. This caused a cut for which the man was treated and released at Marcum & Wallace Memorial Hospital Emergency Department.
While at the ER, McKinney said the man was cursing very loudly and disturbing other patients.
That's when the bike rider allegedly threatened to kill McKinney and four members of the emergency room staff.
McKinney arrested Nakoa Lee Crowe, 32, of Third Street, Ravenna. Crowe was charged with improper passing, fleeing or evading police second degree, menacing, resisting arrest, five counts of terroristic threatening second degree, and two counts of disorderly conduct.
Crowe was arraigned in Estill District Court on October 10. He pleaded not-guilty to the charges. He will return to court on October 19 for a preliminary hearing.

Police Activity Log

An investigation into domestic violence turned into an Irvine man being charged with a felony on Oct. 13.
Officer John Sturniolo went to the man's home, an apartment on Broadway to investigate the report of domestic violence.
The citation states upon Sturniolo's arrival, Andrew Means, 28, was screaming, hitting and cursing. Sturniolo said that Means resisted his attempt to handcuff him.
He said Means' girlfriend ran into the bathroom and would not give her name. She was identified as Paige Estes, who threw a syringe under the couch. Means reportedly had more syringes, three butane lghers and a bent spoon in his jeans pocket.
Sturniolo said Means again began yelling and cursing as he was escorted to the cruiser. He threatened to kill Sturniolo when he gets out of jail.
Means was charged with domestic violence, fourth degree assault, promoting contraband first degree, resisting arrest, disorderly conduct, menacing, and terroristic threatening third degree.
Means was arraigned in Estill District Court on Oct.

14. He pleaded not-guilty to all of the charges.
District Judge William Leach will hold a preliminary hearing on Means' charges on October 19.
Bail for Means has been set at \$10,000 cash.
• Brian Keith Jones, 45, of Coral Street, Irvine was arrested Friday night on Church Street by Deputy Daniel Smith.
The deputy said he had gone to Church Street in an attempt to serve a warrant when Jones took off running. He said he yelled at Jones to stop and told him he was a deputy, but Jones kept running.
Smith said he caught up with Jones in Rising Park.
Jones was charged with fleeing or evading police on foot, first degree.
Bail for Jones on this charge was set at \$7,5000 cash. He was arrested on a new offense while a case was pending.
• Jacob Henry, 21, was charged with fleeing or evading police on foot, promoting contraband second, and drug paraphernalia buy/possess on October 14 by Deputy Daniel Smith.
Smith said he was attempting to serve a warrant

on Henry and told Henry to stop. The deputy stated he chased Henry from Estill Acres to Glynn Court in Wisemantown before he caught Henry. During a search, the deputy said he found a bag with three glove fingers filled with tobacco and a syringe in the pocket.
• Daniel Jones of West Cedar Grove Road, Irvine, was charged with public intoxication and drug paraphernalia on Oct. 7 by Deputy Smith.
Smith was called to the Save-A-Lot parking lot to check out a man who was standing by his vehicle and shaking. The man reportedly told him he was having leg cramps.
The deputy said he saw a pop can with a clear liquid and a cotton filter through the open car door. He said the man attempted to knock the pop can over.
He added that he found a syringe with clear milky substance and cotton filters used for filtering drugs into

syringe, along with small squares of tin foil often used to hold drugs during distribution.
• Bailiff Glenn Carroll served a warrant on Matthew T. King, 31, of Webb Road on Oct. 12. An indictment warrant was served on King the same day by Sheriff Gary Freeman.
• Cindy Ballard, 36, of Clear Creek Road, Irvine, was charged with fourth degree assault (domestic violence) by Deputy Daniel Smith.
Ballard's sister said that Cindy had choked her and pulled her hair. The citation states that Cindy's boyfriend intervened. When Smith arrived at the residence, he said the boyfriend had a bloody nose and a ripped shirt.
Cindy's sister reportedly had red marks and knots on her skinned elbows from being pushed down. The deputy said that Cindy was intoxicated.
