Newman was also charged with 25 counts of wanton endangerment, first degree; fleeing or evading police, first degree; theft by unlawful taking or disposition auto - \$10,000 or more; criminal mischief, first degree; persistent felony offender; failure to give right of way to emergency vehicle; operating on suspended or revoked license; and failure to notify address change to Dept. of Transportation.

All but the last three charges listed are felonies. Theft by unlawful taking of automobile is a Class C felony, punishable by five to ten years in prison. Twenty-nine of the felonies are Class D, punishable by one to five years in prison. Each of the misdemeanors carries a fine and or jail time of up to one year.

Bail for Newman has been set at \$30,000 cash.

Newman was arrested again November 2 by Irvine Officer Brian Cloyd on two bench warrants.

One was for failing to appear in Estill Circuit Court on charges of receiving stolen property (firearm), possession of firearm by convicted felon, fleeing or evading police, second degree (on foot), and persistent felony offender second degree. Circuit Judge Michael Dean signed the warrant with no bail amount being set.

A second warrant on Newman states he failed to appear in circuit court on a charge of theft by unlawful taking or disposition (auto). Judge Dean signed the warrant with no bail amount being set.

Veterans Invited to Attend Program at High School

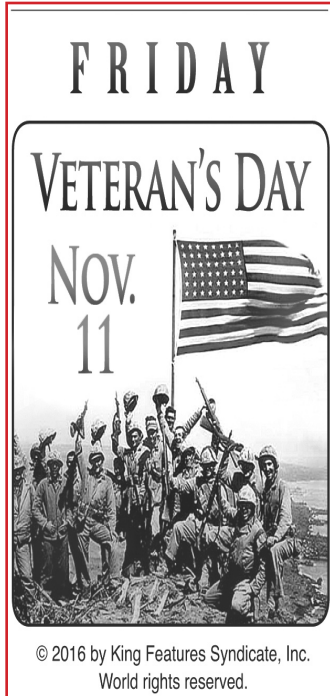

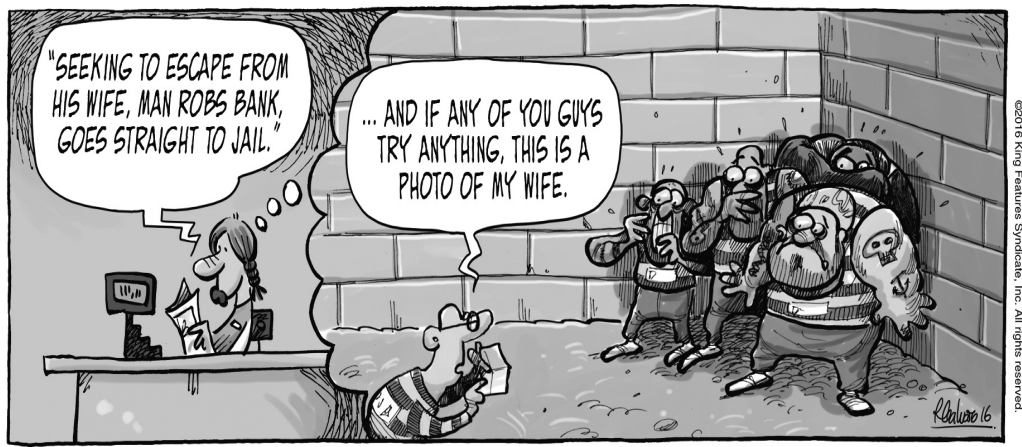

Arrest Log of the Irvine Police Department

A bench warrant was served on Heather D. Rose, 25, of Eades Drive, Irvine, for failing to pay \$173 after being found guilty in Estill District Court of public intoxication of a controlled substance. Judge William Leach set Rose's bail at \$173.00 cash.

William Craig Tuttle, 32, of New Fox Road, Irvine, was arrested November 2 on Broadway by Irvine Police Chief Brad Smith on public intoxication and resisting arrest charges.

Smith said Tuttle told dispatchers that there were men underneath his truck who were vandalizing it. When Smith arrived, he said Tuttle was yelling for the men to come out from under his truck. Smith stated he looked under the truck and there was no one there.

The chief added that Tuttle pulled away and actively resisted arrest while being handcuffed and walked to the cruiser.

Sommer L. Arvin, 36, of Jake's Heavenly Highway, Irvine was arrested November 3 for public intoxication by

Irvine Officer Brian Cloyd.

A bench warrant from Estill District Court states that Arvin failed to appear for a pre-trial conference on a charge of public intoxication of a controlled substance.

Jessica Turner of Poplar Street, Ravenna was arrested November 2 by Irvine Police Sgt. John Sturniolo at her residence for public intoxication. The citation states that she was found hiding at her house and there were two warrants for her arrest.

Gary LaFountain, 42, Laurel Street, Irvine was charged November 4 with violation of a city ordinance, vicious dog. The arresting officer, Cloyd, said that LaFountain's pit bull mix was running loose on the roadway and had become aggressive to pedestrians. The county animal control officer tranquilized the pit bull mix and transported it to the county's pound, pending further court proceedings.

IPD Sgt. Sturniolo served two Madison County District Court bench warrants on LaFountain on Nov. 1, because

of his alleged failure to appear in court there.

Cody Ballard, 25, of Rice Street, Irvine was arrested Nov. 5 for alcohol intoxication, disorderly conduct, and menacing.

Ballard was in front of Rockhouse Bar & Grill when a male passerby noticed him allegedly acting aggressive with two females.

The arresting officer, Sturniolo, said that Ballard became aggressive with the good Samaritan and wanted to fight with him.

The officer said that Ballard had a strong odor of alcohol on his breath, and was unsteady on his feet, and was extremely emotional. Sturniolo said that Ballard began to fight with him at the jail.

Three arrest warrants from Estill District Court were served on Daniel L. Conrad, 31, of Poplar Street, Ravenna by Irvine Capt. Adrian McKinney.

The first warrant charges Conrad with failure to appear in court August 17, 2016 on charges of no registration plates,

and operating on suspended or revoked license.

Conrad was in court on a nine count traffic charge on April 13, 2016. He was found guilty of failure to use a child restraint in a vehicle. Speeding 15 mph over limit, failure to wear seat belts, no rear view mirror, and improper registration plate were merged. Charges of no registration plates, failure to notify address change to department of transportation and failure to owner to maintain required insurance were dismissed.

The warrant says that Conrad failed to pay a \$278 fine. His bail was set at \$278 cash.

The third warrant says Conrad failed to pay a fine of \$808. He was found guilty of failure of owner to maintain required insurance, second on April 13, 2016. Charges of speeding 29 mph or greater, reckless driving, no registration plates, and no registration receipt were merged.

Judge Leach set Conrad's bail at \$808.00 cash.

Two Estill County District Court bench warrants were served November 6 by Sgt.

Sturniolo on Carey Hunter, 24, of Corinth, Ky.

On April 13, 2016, Hunter was found guilty of operating a motor vehicle under the influence. Charges of failure to give right of way and drug paraphernalia were merged. The bench warrant says Hunter failed to pay a fine of \$538. Judge Leach said that Hunter could post bail for \$538.00 in cash.

On March 16, 2016, Hunter was found guilty of public intoxication and disorderly conduct, second degree. The bench warrant says he failed to pay a fine of \$193. Judge Leach set Hunter's bail at \$193.00 cash.

Two Estill County District Court bench warrants were served on Elliott Muncy, 26, of Ironworks Road, Irvine on Oct. 28 by Capt. Adrian McKinney.

One warrant states that Muncy was found guilty Oct. 18, 2013 of disorderly conduct, second degree. A charge of alcohol intoxication in a public place was merged.

Judge Leach says that Muncy has failed to pay a

fine of \$188 plus a service fee of \$30.00 on those charges.

Muncy also was found guilty of failure to wear seat belts and possession of marijuana on May 8, 2013. Failure of non-owner to maintain required insurance was dismissed on Dec. 12, 2012. The complaint states that Muncy failed to appear April 16, 2014 for a pre-trial conference for operating on suspended or revoked operator license. His bond was \$500.00 cash plus a \$30.00 service fee.

An Estill County warrant was served on Samuel Luther Isaacs, 32, of Richmond, Kentucky on October 31.

The warrant had been obtained by Deputy Russell "Doc" Morris. It says that on Sept. 14, 2016, Isaacs unlawfully took two weapons, a .38 revolver and a 357 Taurus revolver from Billy Sebastian's residence.

Isaacs was charged with two counts of theft of a firearm, a Class D felony. A Class D felony is punishable by one to five years in prison.

Bail for Isaacs was set at \$10,000 cash.
