

Police Activity Log

Two injury wrecks were investigated on Friday, February 19 by Deputy Randy Farthing.

The first one occurred around 6:32 p.m. on Spout Springs Road. The deputy stated that Anthony Coffey of Hall Abney Road, Irvine, was traveling west on Spout Springs Road, when he apparently lost control of his vehicle.

Coffey's 2009 Ford Ranger struck a tree and embankment before overturning.

The truck was damaged severely on its top. Coffey was transported by Estill EMS to Marcum & Wallace Memorial Hospital.

Two vehicles were involved in the second collision on Richmond Road around 10:48 p.m.

Deputy Farthing reported that Jarod Baber of Cantril Street, Irvine was following Kenneth Floyd of Ginter Spur, Irvine. Baber told the deputy that Floyd was going to slow, so he attempted to pass him.

The deputy added as Baber attempted to pass, Floyd started to turn left. The two vehicles sideswiped each other.

Baber was uninjured. Floyd was transported to Marcum & Wallace Memorial Hospital by Estill County EMS.

Baber was driving a 1991 Dodge Dakota which was moderately to severely damaged on the right side.

Floyd's 2001 Chrysler PT Cruiser received severe to moderate damages on the left side.

• A Richmond man was arrested February 12 by Trooper A. Brashear following a single vehicle wreck on Webb Road.

The trooper said that Matthew King, 30, was traveling west when he apparently lost control of his vehicle. it went through a fence and came to rest in a field.

Estill EMS responded to the wreck and transported King to Marcum & Wallace Hospital.

The officer said he found a small baggie of crystal meth in the passenger side floorboard, along with a needle and a spoon.

King was charged with operating a motor vehicle under the influence, driving on a DUI suspended license, first offense, trafficking in a controlled substance, first degree and first offense, drug paraphernalia - buy/possess, no registration receive, failure to use seat belts, and failure to produce insurance card.

King was cited to appear in Estill District Court on March 16 for an arraignment.

• An Irvine man was arrested February 2 on a warrant for making a false statement to prevent reduction of benefits.

The warrant was obtained by Emma Wireman of the Ky. Division of Unemployment. She stated that between March 23 and April 20, 2013, that Daniel Ray Philhower Jr., 46, of Noland Court, Irvine received unemployment benefits while working at the same time.

Wireman stated that Philhower owes \$1,192.20.

The warrant was served on Philhower by Mary Gross, a probation and parole officer. Philhower was released from custody on 10 percent of a \$2,500 cash bond

• April K. Goosey, 37, of Pea Ridge Road, Irvine was served with a bench warrant on Feb. 21 by IPD Officer John Sturniolo.

District Judge Bo Leach signed the warrant because Goosey had failure to pay \$135.00. He set her bail as \$135.00 cash.

Sturniolo also served a criminal complaint Feb. 21 on April Goosey, 37, of Rosebud Avenue, Irvine.

The complaint had been obtained by Irvine Police Chief Brad Smith in 2013.

Goosey was charged with leaving the scene of an accident - failure to render aid or assistance, a misdemeanor.

• A bench warrant from Madison District Court was served February 20 by Officer Sturniolo on George Walling, 44, of Versailles.

The warrant was issued saying Walling had failed to pay surety which includes fees. Judge B. Brown set his bail at \$1,055 cash.

• David S. Coffey, 30, of Crooked Creek Road, Irvine was arrested February 14 by Irvine Officer John Sturniolo.

Coffey was charged with no tail light, driving under the influence of alcohol, and driving on a suspended operators license.

• A Madison County bench warrant was served on Kelly A. Hall, 47, of Richmond by Sturniolo.

He was placed on the fugitive document in January 2016 for non payment of fines by Judge C. Hardin, who set Hall's bail at \$100 cash.

• Devin C. Hackensmith, 22, of Laurel, Indiana was arrested Feb. 13 at Ravenna Food Mart by Officer Sturniolo. He was charged with driving under the influence of drugs, second offense.

• Kenneth E. Caldwell Jr., 39, of S. Winn Ave., Irvine was arrested Feb. 17 by Irvine Sgt. Mike Gross on an indictment warrant signed by Judge M. Dean.

The warrant says Caldwell was indicted for criminal possession of a forged instrument second degree, fraudulent use of a credit card, theft by unlawful taking or disposition, and theft by unlawful taking more than \$500 but less than \$10,000.

The 2016 calendar called for students to have 176 instructional days. The four Teacher Equivalency Days will reduce that number to 172 days for students.

A guest at the meeting asked Saylor if the district had applied for Non Traditional Instruction (NTI).

Saylor said no because the district would lose funding in transportation and food services.

"We had children that did not get to eat breakfast and lunch, and that bothers me," Saylor stated. "I really worry about our families when we don't have school."

He said school districts can have a summer feeding program, and he wishes there could also be a winter feeding program.

Dickie Arthur, Director of Pupil Personnel, said he has visited two districts who use NTL. Teachers have to be available for email from their students from 9-3 each day. According to Arthur, contact was little between students and their teacher.

"It's really more about lost instructional time than a loss of funding," Arthur stated.

Memorial Day was not included as an instructional day in the revised calendar.

Mayor W.J. Noland said he had to make a decision about the construction without the council's approval, after a visit from Brandon Campbell, highway engineer. The mayor said one lane of the bridge would be shut down and a stop light would be installed to regulate traffic or both lanes would be shut down for two months. He said he preferred to have one lane open, and the council agreed with him.

They must also possess a high school diploma or GED and been a resident of Kentucky for three years prior to their appointment.

The person appointed by the education commissioner will serve until December 31 of this year.

The non-partisan filing deadline for school board members is Tuesday, August 9 at 4 p.m. in the county clerk's office.

Board members in districts 1 and 2 are also up for re-election this year.
