The 2016 calendar called for students to have 176 instructional days. The four Teacher Equivalency Days will reduce that number to 172 days for students.

A guest at the meeting asked Saylor if the district had applied for Non Traditional Instruction (NTI).

Saylor said no because the district would lose funding in transportation and food services.

We had children that did not get to eat breakfast and lunch, and that bothers me," Saylor stated. "I really worry about our families when we don't have school."

He said school districts can have a summer feeding program, and he wishes there could also be a winter feeding program.

Dickie Arthur, Director of Pupil Personnel, said he has visited two districts who use NTI. Teachers have to be available for email from their students from 9-3 each day. According to Arthur, contact was little between students and their teacher.

"It's really more about lost instructional time than a loss of funding," Arthur stated.

Memorial Day was not included as an instructional day in the revised calendar.


She stated if it doesn't work, the city should remove it.
