Prom Time

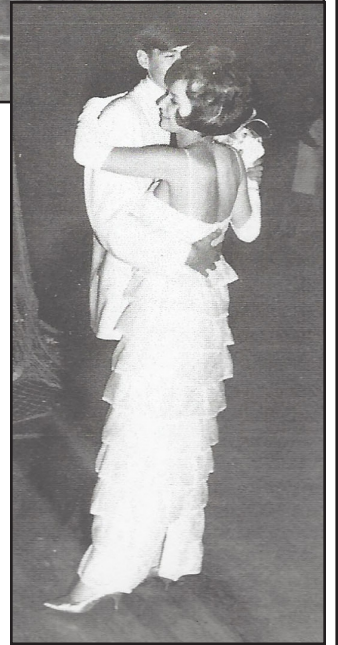
Prom night is coming up shortly and it brings back prom memories for me. The prom in 1968 and 1967 was, of course, the highlight of our high school social calendar. During my time at ECHS, there wasn't a more important date than the prom. If you

didn't have a prom date . . . well, socially that was a problem. Most went as couples. The guys wore suits, white sport coats and a few tuxes. Girls wore long formals; they weren't as fancy as today's prom dresses but they were very pretty. You just didn't show as much skin as the skimpy dresses do today. The principal at the time, Mr. Luther Patrick, only allowed junior and senior students to go to prom; no outsiders or underclassmen could attend until 1967, when student council finally convinced him to allow an open prom. The guy I was dating was a senior, so I was on my way to the prom. I was so excited. I borrowed a dress from a friend. The dress was yellow brocade, full length with an empire waist and a bow in front. I wore tiny yellow bows in my hair and wore a wristlet of yellow carnations. The theme that year for the prom was "Polynesian Nights," a Hawaiian type

theme. The gym was beautifully decorated with streamers, netting and tropical flowers. The "Monarchs from Louisville, Kentucky played rock-n-rock music until midnight. I danced until my feet were sore; my date didn't like to dance, so a bunch of us girls fast danced in a group and did the "Mashed Potatoes," "The Big B" and the "Swim." We didn't ride to the Prom in limousines just hot looking cars like 57 Chevys and Ford Mustangs. There was no FLO Party; maybe some parties later at the Ravenna Beach. We could access the river at the Locks back then. We had a nice sandy beach to layout and swim. The Senior Prom is always the last dance of the school year. It ends the time of a full high school career. Then Graduation . . . ready to seek the world. The 60s were a great time for dances; the music, cars and everything about high school was great.
