UK Wildcats basketball coach John Calipari has been busy handing out scholarship offers to players in the 2017 and 2018 recruiting classes the last two weeks.

One intriguing prospect is Putnam Science Academy (Conn.) guard Hamidou Diallo. He has a bevy of scholarship offers, including Connecticut and Duke.

Diallo plays AAU summer basketball for the New York Rens, based in his hometown of Queens, N.Y., in the Nike Youth Basketball League.

Marc Allard, sports editor of the Norwich Bulletin, says the 6-4 Diallo has the ability to penetrate defense but also hit from 3-point range. He led his team with 32 3-pointers last season and averaged 16 points per game.


