Deputy charges 2 in separate thefts

Two Estill men were charged Friday and Saturday with theft by unlawful taking in unrelated incidents.

On Friday, June 17, Deputy Russell "Doc" Morris charged Dustin Allen Willis, 29, with the theft by unlawful taking less than \$500 and under \$10,000.

Morris said that Willis charged \$1,124.32 to an account of Estill Wood Products between June 6 and 9 of this year.

The second man has been

arrested for stealing from his parents.

Deputy Morris was dispatched to 75 Beechwood Drive to investigate a theft.

A citation states that Dalton Adams, 21, of that address admitted to the deputy that he had removed several items from his parents' home without their permission.

It is unknown if the items have been recovered.

Morris said the items were valued at over \$500.

Adams was charged June 18 with theft by unlawful taking over \$500 and less than \$10,000.

Hargett man arrested for receiving benefits while working on job

A Hargett resident has been arrested on a warrant for allegedly working while drawing unemployment benefits.

The warrant says that Myers owes the Division of Unemployment \$1,687.00.

The charge is a Class D felony. If found guilty, Myers can be fined and sentenced to prison for one to five years

School board hires Riley as attorney

The Estill County school board met on June 16th before a crowd of people. Several students were recognized by the board during the meeting for their stellar accomplishments this school year.

Sarah Barnes and Emily Taulbee, members of the FFA, were recognized for receiving the state degree which is the highest award that can be obtained from the FFA in the state of Kentucky. Lynn Miller said that the award is based on a culmination of four years of work which includes 3,000 hours of unpaid labor and 50 hours of community service. Miller added that both girls had been very active in the chapter over the past four years.

Emily Dixon and Ashley Stone were recognized for being the first group to participate in an Agri-Science competition. Miller said that the girls had to do extensive research for their project and

will be moving on to compete at the national level in the fall.

Adam McKinney was recognized for his hard work and dedication to a service project in which he worked on his family farm as well as working for others. McKinney worked on the farm cutting and baling hay and received \$300 in prize money.

Peyton Maybrier was the statewide middle school art contest winner. Maybrier chose to do her artwork on the Kentucky Nutrition Program and was the winner out of 750 other middle schools in the state.

Head softball Coach Shirley Beard was recognized for being inducted into the Softball Hall of Fame. For more than thirty years Beard has coached softball in Estill County and has led the Lady Engineers to numerous wins during her career.

For the third month in a row the board discussed hiring an attorney. Several options were presented to the

board and once again L.W. Beckley made the motion to hire local attorney Jason Riley. Jon Bicknell seconded the motion and it carried with a three to two vote. Robbie Starling and Patty Hood opposed the vote. Riley will replace Jerry Gilbert who resigned as board attorney last month.

A pay resolution pertaining to the renovations at South Irvine was approved by the board. Superintendent Jeff Saylor said that the deadline of June 30th was quickly approaching and that the project was 99 percent completed. He said that a letter had been sent to Riddell Construction from the architect to inform them that if the project wasn't completed by the deadline that they would not be able to collect the rest of their revenue.

Saylor was pleased to announce that three teaching positions had been opened up at South Irvine. He said that the district will receive 100 percent reimbursement from

the state for those three positions. Saylor said that it was a win/win situation because not only was the school getting three new teachers but it wasn't costing the board any money.

Saylor said that the student discipline code had not been updated in years. He said with the new revisions it would give parents guidance on the behavior that is expected out of students.

Board members were given paperwork on the superintendent's upcoming evaluation and advised by Assistant Superintendent Tonya Isaacs to take the paperwork home and do the evaluation. She said that they would meet again in two weeks and discuss the evaluation openly during the meeting.

"As a new superintendent it's good for him moving forward now that he has the first year under his belt," stated Isaacs.

The board will meet in special session on June 30th at 6 p.m.
