Father's Day

Father's Day is Sunday, June 19. Each year I try to come up with something different about fathers since I have been writing this column for seven years now.

Here's to Dad. He was tough, independent and a role model. Born in 1915, he was the second oldest of 6 children, 4 boys and 2 girls. One girl died of whooping cough within the first year of birth. The rest grew up on a farm in the community of Crooked Creek in Estill County.

Dad didn't serve in the military during World War II; because he didn't pass his medical exam; but he did

serve in the CCC (Civilian Conservation Corp). He was in a unit in Morehead. The CCC built roads, bridges, post offices and courthouses during this time.

It was a project started by President Franklin Roosevelt during the Great Depression as a part of the New Deal. Dad and Mom were survivors of the Great Depression and they believed that a penny saved was a penny earned.

In 1936, Dad married Mom, a quiet and reserved person. He was the direct opposite, chatty and a hyper person and a strict disciplinarian. Dad believed that children should be seen and not heard, and that if you spare the rod, you spoil the child. Needless to say I got my share of spankings.

Although some may think these conditions were less than favorable with modern times. I remember my childhood as being a happy time; although I did have to work very hard on the farm; it taught many valuable lessons.

When I was 18 and a senior in high school I became obsessed with joining the Air Force and becoming a nurse. I wanted to serve in Vietnam. My Mom thought otherwise. She threw a fit; she cried and cried and told me all the negative things about it. Mainly, that I might get killed. On

the other hand, my Dad said, "Sure, you are old enough to strike out on your own," and surprisingly, he said, "You're old enough to make up your own mind." He said no more. I took it as a rite of passage, a vote of confidence in me making my own decisions and owning my mistakes. I didn't go because of my mother; I didn't want to break her heart.

My Dad quietly slipped into eternity in his sleep on Tuesday night, February 6, 2007 at the age of 92.
