Irvine Police have charged four more with trafficking in controlled substances.

On Monday, June 27, Christopher R. District Court was also served on Isaacs. Isaacs, 26, of Main Street, Irvine was arrested on eight charges. Officer John Sturniolo said the night before Isaacs' arrest, he asked a confidential informant (CI) if he wanted to buy a gram of heroin for \$150.
