

Recent graduate injured in wreck

Matthew Young was seriously injured in an automomorning.

The crash site was about the intersection of KY 89 and KY 82.

Deputy Doc Morris said that Young was traveling north (toward Winchester) in a 1999 Toyota Camry.

vehicle crossed the double yellow line and left the road on the opposite side. It went over an embankment and struck a wooden fence.

The impact caused the fence boards to penetrate the front windshield. The collision report states the driver was struck by the fence boards which caused severe head trauma.

Morris said that Young was extracted from the vehicle and transported to Marcum & Wallace Memorial Hospital. He was then airlifted to UK Medical Center.

"Recallable Nickel" passes board

The 'Recallable Nickel' was up for vote during the school board meeting on Thursday night.

Superintendent Jeff Saylor said that he had been out in the community discussing the benefits of the proposed nickel tax and he was coming to the board members on behalf of 2,390 students who deserve quality facilities.

He stated that his recommendation to the board was to pass that and begin the process of advertising and to see where the journey would

take them. "This being a non-elec-

tion year, what exactly is this going to cost us to take this to election?" asked Board member L.W. Beckley.

"About \$25,000 according to the clerk and we have that amount in the budget. As a matter of fact we have \$30,000 in the budget because if we do get to an election, I feel like we need to campaign," replied Saylor.

Beckley said that he was still hearing ups and downs from people in the community about the matter but he commended Mr. Saylor and

Beckley added he had heard more diverse comments regarding the nickel last go around.

Saylor said that he felt like it was important to be open and honest with people and that he had never said that this wasn't a tax increase. It is a tax increase but he said it was important for the people to make the final decision once the board passes it. The process would begin with

his staff on the efforts that he advertising, a public hearnext board meeting, and if nobody gets a petition started then sometime in October it would go to election.

"I heard a lot of positive tax than he had during the comments, I've gotten emails from people saying that they support it and I've heard from people that they can't afford a tax increase," stated Saylor.

Beckley then asked Saylor if something happened and this failed at election was it true that the four percent tax increase would automatically kick in.
