Coach Hughes Named to Lead Lady Engineers

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Hughes said most people would never believe how much knowledge he had of the game. She noted that he also kept both, players on the bench and fans behind the bench, laughing at some of his comments.

The new coach came to Estill County from Pulaski County where she attended elementary and high school. Hughes played basketball while attending Pulaski County High school for three years; then at newly-formed Southwestern Pulaski for her senior

Hughes got a basketball scholarship at Sue Bennett College in London where she played for three years before the school closed. She then transferred to Eastern Kentucky University where she finished her college education.

Coach Hughes was a freshman coach at Southwestern for three years and came to Estill County in 2004-05 as assistant to Mark McKinley, another Southwestern assistant. That was the last year the Lady Engineers competed in the 30th District and 10th Region. They finished 6-22 for the season and were beaten badly by George Rogers Clark in the district.

The following year Estill moved to the 14th Region and 56th District to compete against Lee, Powell and Owsley Counties. The first year in the 14th, 2005-06, the Lady Engineers went to the region as runner-up to Powell County and finished even overall at 14-14.

McKinley and Hughes took the Lady Engineers to the region again in 2006-07 with a district win over Powell County and finished 14-16. They took teams to the region three more times before McKinley's departure in 2014.

Hughes has also served as girls head basketball coach at Estill County Middle School where she took over for the late Bobby Sewell around 2008. She will continue in that role at the present time.

She said the middle school program struggled at first but she is proud that over the past four to five years, Estill has been able to compete well in the conference against even the Madison County middle schools. Hughes said they have been among the top four in the conference in recent years.

Hughes takes over a program that has lost three "really good" players including center Sidney Danyear, point guard Kaley Treadway, and 14th Region "Player of the Year" McKenzie Flynn, a forward. She said Flynn and Danyear were responsible for around 20 rebounds per game and the three accounted for a lot of points.

"We'll miss their size," said Hughes. "We will be short, we just have to be fast, more agressive and more defensive."

Estill's only returning, starting senior will be Savannah Brewer, whom Hughes says is "quick, aggressive, and hard to guard."

The only other returning starter is junior guard Meagan Bellamy who is a great 3-point shooter.

Junior forward Amelia Farmer will be back after being out last season following an ACL injury from soccer. "We really missed her athletic ability," says Coach Hughes.

Another junior for Estill will be Kiely Flynn, a guard who is improving and handling the ball better.

Other juniors include center Taylor Duechele and forward Shelby Danyeur. Two expected to return as sophomores are Kaylee Riddell and Mary Robinson.

Freshman Britney Mason played for the Lady Engineers last year as an 8th grader. Mia Hale and Hannah Baker will be 8th graders this year but are likely to play a lot for the Lady Engineers in the fall.

District play will be "tough" for Estill County in a rebuilding year. The three 56th District opponents lost a combined "one" player to graduation.

Lee County lost their center but return everyone else with a large amount of playing time for Coach Matt Watterson, including standout junior Hannah Kash.

Coach Ken Jones, who is always competitive at Powell County, lost no one and will a have a squad of experienced juniors and seniors for the upcoming

Charlie Davidson has got to be happy as coach of the Owsley County Lady Owls. They won the 56th District last year and will return all players including college prospect Maci Gibson, an all-position player who makes herself known all over the floor.

"I think we'll be competitive," said Coach Hughes. "We'll have to slow Lee and Owsley down a little to have a chance."

Coach Hughes lives in Estill County at Winston and is single. She says it's important to her for a coach to live in the county to promote the program. She feels that being single allows her more opportunity to work with her team.

She added, "I'm just thankful for the opportunity that the school and the school system has given me."
