KSP makes arrest for drug trafficking

An Estill County man was arrested Thursday afternoon for trafficking in drugs by Kentucky State Police.

KSP and Deputy Russell "Doc" Morris had received several anonymous tips that drugs were being sold at 41 Front Street.

After the door was opened, the officers reported seeing the female homeowner and a male in the back bedroom of the home.

Trooper J. Shepherd talked with the homeowner. She reportedly told him, "If there are drugs inside my home, or my room, I want them removed."

He said as they began a consented search of the home, he noticed that man step out of the bedroom and then step back into the room and out of their sight.

The citation states that Deputy Morris found a black vial underneath a UK hat in the bedroom. The vial contained 11 green bags of a crystal like substance believed to be crystal methamphetamine.

The man, Bradley Joe Young, 50, of Chestnut Stand, Irvine was charged with trafficking in a controlled substance (less than two grams of methamphetamine), first offense.

He reportedly told the officers, "Well, this isn't my home, and I don't sleep in that bedroom."

Young was lodged in the Three Forks Regional Jail in Beattyville. His bail has been set at \$10,000 cash.

Court records say he was arrested on a new charged while a case is pending.

Indictments are returned

Indictments were returned Friday, August 25 by the Estill County Grand Jury. These indictments are listed in the order they are numbered by the court system.

Jerry D. Stone, 50, of Old Fox Road, Irvine was indicted for third degree assault of a correctional officer, first degree escape, resisting arrest, and fleeing or evading police second degree.

Stone is accused of striking Deputy Jailer Mike Goosey on May 22 when he allegedly escaped Goosey's custody while at Marcum & Wallace Hospital.

Deputy Daniel Smith conducted the investigation.

Jason A. Alvey, 42, address unknown,

was indicted for trafficking in a controlled substance, first degree and first offense (methamphetamine), tampering with physical evidence, drug paraphernalia - buy/possess, and resisting arrest.

The indictment states that Alvey tried to eat a baggie containing a crystal substance on April 27 when he had 1.062 grams of methamphetamine in his possession. He also had a pipe, baggies, and scale.

The arrested officer was KSP Trooper T. Robinson.

A six count indictment was returned against David E. Stamper, 44, of Eades Drive, Irvine.

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IPD arrests a driver for doing "burn outs"

At least one person was arrested Saturday for allegedly doing burn-outs during Revive River Drive.

Irvine Chief Brad Smith said he observed the red Chevy Camaro burning tires and spinning in the middle of the road.

Smith stated he attempted to conduct a traffic stop on the vehicle, but it continued west on River Drive in excess of 70 mph, passing vehicles and pedestrians in a reckless manner.

The Camaro turned right onto Main Street and Sgt. John Sturniolo also attempted to stop the vehicle.

The vehicle continued through several red lights and the construction area on Winchester Road before Irvine Police lost sight

of it. Smith then recognized the vehicle on Mt. Crest Drive where he said the hood and tires were still hot.

Witnesses who were present when the pursuit started confirmed the car was driven by its owner, Brian Mays, 28, of Mt. Crest, Irvine.

A citation by Irvine Officer Brian Cloyd said officers knocked at Mays' apartment for several minutes. He did not answer the door. Neighbors told police they had seen a man and woman walk inside.

After contacting the county attorney, he advised that IPD could make entry.

Mays was found in an upstairs bedroom.

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Because of the rain leftover from Harvey, Picnic in the Park was moved to the Estill County Fairbarn on Friday evening. Seusical was the winning theme for a table decorated by Lori Dawes, Kara Beth Singleton and Vicki Singleton. Citizens Guaranty Bank's table also tied for first place.

Judge orders landfill to preserve evidence

County officials had asked for damages from Advanced Disposal during a motion in Estill Circuit Court last Wednesday.

Special Judge Jean Chenault Logue presided over the motion hour with lawyers from both sides present. There were also attorneys there from Waste Management and the state's Energy and Environmental Cabinet (EEC).

County attorney Rodney Davis said the county was seeking enforcement of an agreed order from last December.

"The material shouldn't be there, and it should be removed," he stated.

He and another attorney said the landfill was continuing to put garbage on top of the radioactive waste.

"It makes it more diffi-

cult for our experts to go in," he stated.

Davis added that negotiations between the county and landfill over Tenorm have failed.

Judge Logue told the landfill representatives not to put anything else on top of the radioactive material.

County officials said the landfill had denied access to look at the landfill by the county judge and attorney.

"They're asking us to trust them on where the location is," Davis stated.

An attorney hired by the county asked Judge Logue to preserve evidence, which she agreed to for three months. She asked the landfill to preserve three acres and may extend that to seven acres during a motion hour on Nov. 10.

The attorney for the landfill argued that adding

material to the landfill's slope was to help water drainage.

The landfill had submitted a revised CAP to the EEC last Tuesday. An attorney from EEC said the revised one was the result of public comments made on the first one.

He stated the new CAP is on the EEC's web page and local citizens can comment on it.
