

Grand jury returns indictments Sept. 28

The investigation was conducted by KSP Trooper Nick Brumback.

Michael Adams, 19, Plum Street, Irvine was named in an indictment, charging him with possession of a controlled substance, first degree and first offense.

According to the indictment, Adams possessed methamphetamine on August 15.

Irvine Officer Colton Lewis was the arresting officer.

April Lynn Walker, 40, of Cedar Grove Road, Irvine was indicted for theft by unlawful taking all overs \$10,000 or more.

The indictment states that between December 2016 and December, 2017, she took \$20,100.47 for her own use from the Estill County Football Boosters' bank account.

School Resource Officer Michael Gross appeared before the grand jury.

Sasha Brzezinski aka Sasha Summerfield, 35, of Carhartt Drive, Irvine was indicted for first degree bail jumping.

The indictment says she had been released from custody by court order upon the condition that she appear at a scheduled time and place in connection with her felony charge.

It adds that she failed to appear on July 27 and a bench warrant was issued for her arrest by Circuit Judge Michael Dean.

Commonwealth's Detective Joie Peters investigated the case.

A seven-count indictment was returned against **Mickie S. Delucio**, 50, of Poplar Street, Ravenna.

The indictment charges

Delucio with five counts of trafficking in a controlled substance, first degree and first offense, drug paraphernalia - buy/possess, and tampering with physical evidence.

On August 1, the indictment says Delucio gave methamphetamine to a confidential informant working for the intent to sell.

On August 7, she allegedly sold methamphetamine for \$60.

The indictment said that Delucio had methamphetamine in her possession on August 8 which she intended to sell.

On those three occasions, the indictment stated the amount of methamphetamine was less than two grams making the charges a Class D felony.

The indictment adds that on August 10, Delucio possessed 5.4 ounce grams and on August 7, 3.5 grams of methamphetamine.

She is charged with Class C felonies on those two charges because the amount exceeds two grams.

The drug paraphernalia allegedly included three glass pipes and five scales.

The indictment says she manipulated the rear seat of Police Chief Brad Smith's vehicle in an attempt to destroy evidence of methamphetamine.

Sgt. John Sturniolo was the investigating officer.

Terry L. Hammonds, 40, of McKee, was named in a ten count indictment.

He was charged with four counts of attempted murder of a police officer and six counts of first degree wanton endangerment of a police officer.

The indictment states that on April 30, Hammonds attempted to cause the death

of Kentucky State Police Officers Carl Roark, Scott Townsley, Tyler Morris, and Casey Caudill.

It adds that he created a substantial danger of physical injury to six officers by firing a weapon towards them.

The six officers were Roark, Townsley, Morris, Caudill, Jack Lakes, and Nick Brumback.

KSP Lt. Chris Short appeared before the grand jury in this case.

Sean Schiffler, 27, of Walnut Grove, Irvine, **Chipper Hitchcock**, 22, of Dry Ridge Road, Irvine, and **Justin Hebert**, 25, of SE Traylor Road, Irvine were named as co-defendants in an indictment.

Schiffler is charged with first degree wanton endangerment.

The indictment says on October 1, 2017, he fired a weapon close to three individuals.

Hitchcock and Hebert were also indicted for first degree wanton endangerment and a second charge of first degree criminal mischief.

According to the indictment, they fired a weapon near a home on October 1, 2017.

The indictment adds the two men also fired a weapon at Steven Schiffler's vehicle several times, causing damage.

Trooper Nick Brumback conducted the investigation.

Jack Cockrell Jr., 50, of Wisemantown Road, Irvine and **Harold Durham Jr.**, 51, of Doe Creek Road, Irvine were named as co-defendants in a four count indictment.

The indictment charges both men with trafficking in a controlled substance first

degree and first offense. It states on April 27, the men attempted to sell heroin to a confidential informant on the Richmond Road.

Cockrell was also charged with possession of a controlled substance, second degree (a suboxone strip) and tampering with physical evidence. He allegedly threw a bottle containing one gram of heroin in the back of a vehicle.

Cockrell was charged with being a second degree persistent felony offender. He was previously convicted of one prior felony offense.

Durham was indicted for being a first degree persistent felony offender. The indictment states that he was previously convicted of at least two prior felony offenses.]

Irvine Police Sgt. John Sturniolo conducted the investigation.

Joseph R. Harrison, 31, of Broadway, Irvine was indicted for possession of a controlled substance, first degree and first offense (methamphetamine) and drug paraphernalia - buy/possess (42 syringes).

The investigating officer was Colton Lewis.

Brandon Keith Richardson, 28 of Substation Road, Irvine was indicted for second degree burglary, second degree criminal mischief, possession of a controlled substance, first degree and first offense (syringe loaded with narcotics) and first degree persistent felony offender.

The investigating officer, Deputy Doc Morris, said that Richardson entered a residence located at 80 Substation Road on July 8 with the intent to commit a crime. He kicked in the door of the

residence causing damage.

Zachary Lee Thomas, 23, of Wisemantown Road, Irvine was indicted for rear license not illuminated, operating a motor vehicle under the influence, first offense, possession of a controlled substance, first degree and first offense (methamphetamine), drug paraphernalia - buy/possess (clear plastic bags), and operating on suspended or revoked operator's license.

Thomas was traffic stopped on August 23 by Officer Colton Lewis.

Kevin R. Jordan, 36, of South Irvine Road was indicted on five charges.

He was charged with fleeing or evading police on foot, tampering with physical evidence, trafficking in marijuana, trafficking in a controlled substance (methamphetamine), and second degree persistent felony offender.

Irvine Officer Jason Conrad charged Jordan on August 2.

James Harrison, 39, of Irvine was indicted for public intoxication, resisting arrest, criminal mischief second degree, assault, third degree of a police officer, and first degree persistent felony offender.

The indictment states that on April 30, Harrison broke Deputy Doc Morris' glasses and kicked him in the face.

Eddie D. Sizemore, 25, of S. Court Street, Irvine was indicted for second degree burglary, fleeing or evading police on foot, menacing, resisting arrest, and second degree persistent felony offender.

The indictment states that Sizemore unlawfully entered the residence of Tyler Mansfield on June 18.

It adds that he place KSP

Officer Casey Caudill in imminent physical danger by taking an aggressive stance toward the officer.

Gloria Means, 42, of Rice Station Road, Irvine was indicted for assault third degree (EMS, Fire, Rescue Squad) and resisting arrest.

Deputy Doc Morris said on June 12, she kicked an EMS employee in the groin area.

Richard Young, 33, of Booneville, was indicted for tampering with physical evidence and first degree persistent felony offender.

The indictment states that Young altered a drug test on August 30 in which he believed was going to be used in an official proceeding.

Probation and Parole Officer Eric Puckett investigated.

Autumn F. Reed, 32, Little Ross Creek, Irvine and **Orville Eugene Puckett**, 49, of N. Plum Street Irvine were named as co-defendants in an indictment.

They were charged with possession of a controlled substance, first degree, second offense (methamphetamine), resisting arrest, tampering with physical evidence, and first degree persistent felony offender.

Puckett was also charged with drug paraphernalia - buy/possess (syringe) and wanton endangerment, second degree - police officer. The indictment states that he created substantial danger to Trooper Derek Lovett by having a syringe hidden in his pants.

Trooper Lovett was assisting Officer Lewis with the investigation.

An indictment is an accusation only. A person is presumed innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

Jobie A. Kirby, 35, as charged with two counts of possession of a controlled substance, first degree and first offense.

Irvine Chief Brad Smith had responded October 3 to Marcum & Wallace Memorial Hospital at the request of Jail Staffer Chad Smith.

Chad Smith reported that Kirby had been arrested earlier by Kentucky State Police and was taken to the hospital for clearance.

The jail employee reported he found three white pills,

suspected hydrocodone, and suspected methamphetamine.

under the influence, reckless driving, and prescription drugs not in proper container.

23 year old Irvine man is charged with rape of 13 year old in March

An Irvine man has been charged with the rape of a 13 year old.

The Irvine Police Department began investigating the case in late July. The mother of the 13 year old female had asked them to investigate.

IPD interviewed the girl and she admitting to having sexual relations with the man

during the month of March.

The citation states the mother found out and removed the girl's cell phone. On it, the mother saw that the daughter was communicating with the 23 year old male.

The male, Cole M. Warren, of Edgewater Drive, Irvine, was interviewed on

October 1 by IPD.

He admitted to having sexual intercourse with the female on three occasions. He admitted that on two of those occasions, he knew she was only 13.

He told police that he had also received oral sex on one occasion from the female. She had allegedly sent him

two sexually explicit pictures.

Officer Colton Lewis charged Warren with second degree rape -- no force, second degree sodomy, and possession/viewing matter portraying a sexual performance by a minor.

Warren was lodged in the Three Forks Regional Jail.

Larry Stewart, democrat candidate for jailer, was present. He is a former businessman and currently works for IMU.

He is challenging republican and current jailer Beverly Bo Morris for the position. Morris did not attend the forum.

"The jail is the biggest drain on the county budget," Stewart stated. "We've got to keep those expenses down."

He said concerns of the voters including the work program and why have a jailer with no jail. But the biggest concern was the budget.

Stewart attended a meeting several months ago with the Department of Corrections held at the Estill County Courthouse. During that meeting, local officials, press, and those seeking county offices were told of a plan to use work release inmates in the county.

Stewart said if elected, he would work more than 40 hours a week to avoid overtime because the jailer's position is salaried.

The next forum will be on Thursday, Oct. 18.

If he is convicted on all charges, he could serve up to 38 years in prison.

Hatton was arrested August 14, one day after school started for the 2018-19 year.

He pled not-guilty during his video arraignment in Estill District Court. Hatton waived his right to a preliminary hearing on August 22, which sent the case directly to the grand jury.

He was released from custody on a \$50,000 cash bond. Hatton's attorney is Randy O'Neil of Richmond.

Hatton had been assistant soccer coach for six years and head coach for one year. He is no longer coaching.

An indictment is an accusation only. Hatton is presumed innocent until he is proven guilty by a court of law.
