The city has \$35,155.94 in unpaid property taxes over recent years.

Davis said the city can sell the tax bills, but he recommended foreclosing on properties.

After some discussion, the council asked Davis to write letters to the twenty property owners who owe the most in taxes to the city and advise them if the taxes are not paid, the city will foreclose on their property.

A public hearing was held for comments for the purchase of a fire truck using a grant from USDA Rural Development. If received the fire department must match

Davis presented a model sign ordinance to the council to look over because they have talked about amending the city's sign ordinance.

He added the county is also looking at amending its sign ordinance because of campaign and business signs in right of ways and on utility poles.
