

Local Police Activity Report

- Sheena Tackett, 32, of White Pine Lane, Ravenna was charged with possession of a controlled substance, first degree, first offense (methamphetamine) and drug paraphernalia - buy/poless on June 16 by IPD Sgt. John Sturniolo.

She posted 10% of a \$2,000 bail and will be in court on July 18.

- Elliott Muncy, 28, of Iron Works Road, Irvine was charged with possession of a controlled substance, first degree and first offense (methamphetamine) on June 15 by KSP Trooper C. Roark.

Citation states that Muncy was at McDonalds and had active warrants on him.

Muncy pled not-guilty during his arraignment June 18. He will return for a preliminary hearing on June 20. His bail has been set at \$5,000 cash.

- Gloria Means, 41, of Rice Station Road, Irvine was arrested June 12 at her residence by Deputy Russell Morris.

The deputy served a Bath County warrant on Means, after being called to her home. He said that Means kicked an EMS employee in the groin area.

Bail for Means was set at \$1,000 cash. She was arraigned in Estill District Court on Monday and pled not-guilty. She will return on June 20 for a preliminary hearing.

- IPD Officer Colton Lewis served an arrest warrant on Justin Means, 19, of Rice Station Road on June 14.

The warrant charged J. Means with fraudulent use of a credit card under \$500 and theft by deception. The case was investigated by KSP Trooper Ty Robinson.

- A bench warrant was served by Officer Lewis on Charles T. Maness, 38, of Autumn Court, Irvine, on June 14.

District Judge Wm. Leach signed the warrant

because Maness allegedly failed to pay a \$50 fine and \$35.00 service fee from a 2017 court coase.

Judge Leach set Maness' bail at \$85.00.

- Officer Lewis arrested Crystal Gail Rawlins, 40, of Stacy Lane, Irvine on June 14.

The Irvine officer was assisting Deputy Morris, and Rawlins was sitting in the driver seat of the vehicle. She was charged with public intoxication of a controlled substance.

- IPD Officer Brian Cloyd charged Jacob Harrison, 26, of Wall Street, Irvine on June 15 for disorderly conduct second degree and public intoxication.

- Officer Cloyd arrested Dale Conrad, 42, of N. Madison, Irvine on charges of alcohol intoxication, disorderly conduct, second degree, and resisting arrest on June 16.

- Irvine Chief Brad Smith arrested William D.

Puckett, 27, of Hood Avenue, Irvine on an arrest warrant obtained by BJ Brock of CSX Railroad Police Department.

The warrant states that on May 23, Puckett attempted to sell cross tie plates to Cox Recycling, knowing the cross ties had been stolen.

Puckett's bail was set at \$10,000 cash.

He pled not-guilty to the charge when arraigned in Estill District Court. His preliminary hearing is scheduled for June 20.

- Wesley J. Edmonson, 41, of Red Lick Road, Irvine faces four new charges after Officer Lewis attempted to serve four active warrants on him.

He ran into a heavily wooded area where he was pursued by Officer Lewis and Deputies Morris and McIntosh.

Edmonson was charged with fleeing or evading police, alcohol intoxication, the wanton endangerment of a

police officer, and resisting arrest.

Ravenna Chief Ken White and Constable Ricky Williams also assisted with Edmonson's arrest.

The four active warrants were then served on Edmonson.

One warrant was from Powell District Court because he allegedly failed to pay a \$323 bond.

The other three warrants were from Estill District Court. One of them was because Edmonson had failed to appear on a charge of illegal possession of a legend drug.

He also reportedly failed to appear to answer chages of alcohol intoxication, fleeing or evading police, drug paraphernalia, trafficking in a controlled substance, and tampering with physical evidence.

The final warrant was issued because he failed to report for drug testing on the above charges.

Although they are not treating patients with emergencies, the military hopes this training will prepare them for emergencies on the field.

"This is kind of what I like to do best," said Major Brett Ringger of the Air National Guard.

When he is not serving in the Guards, he is an optometrist in Texas.

Ringger told of a man in a wheelchair who came for a vision screening. He said the man had difficulty going to a regular optometrist because of their fixed equipment, but the portable equipment used in Operation Bobcat worked well.

A story was told of an Estill man who went to Operation Bobcat for a vision screening. He received new free glasses, which helped him pass his Commercial Driver's License test on Monday.

The free glasses are single lens and are available in one to two days.

"I've got my smile back," one lady wrote on Facebook after getting her teeth filled.

Operation Bobcat also does cleaning and extractions.

According to the military, the dental and vision services are the most popular. However, this means a longer wait for them.

In Lee County, a man was told there was a four hour wait for a service. It was recommended that if he didn't wait, to get in line at 7:30 a.m. and wait until the doors opened.

The hours for Operation Bobcat are Monday-Saturday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., and Sunday, noon to 4 p.m.

Fiscal court to file lawsuit

According to Davis, an estimated 10 to 20 Estill Countians use Birch Communications for their telephone service.

He will be seeking an injunction against Birch Communications to stop the collection of the 911 fee.

He will also likely ask for restitution be made to the affected residents, the county's legal fees, and court costs.

Davis told the fiscal court the case is not likely to be heard until July or August.

First reading was given to the county's new administrative code. Second reading is expected later this month, so the ordinance will go into effect at the beginning of the new fiscal year on July 1.

Several county employees have worked on the new code over the last six or seven months.

The fiscal court also adopted a holiday schedule for the new fiscal year. Judge Williams said the schedule is pretty much in line

with state holidays.

In the past, county offices closed for holidays while some offices, such as the circuit clerk's and circuit court, remained open.

Tom Mullen, director of the Estill County Animal Shelter, announced that from 9-12 on Saturday, residents can bring their pets in and have them microchipped for \$25 each.

The microchips help to locate the pet's owner if it becomes lost.

Starting July 1, the shelter will be open from 9-12 on Saturdays.

"If we can adopt a dog out, basically it pays for itself," said Mullen.

Anthony and Brittany Conrad asked the fiscal court to adopt Stewart Fork Road.

"We have got roads out here right now that are falling apart," said Williams.

He estimated that it would cost \$15,000 to \$20,000 to fix the Conrads' road.

Davis explained the legal steps the Conrads must go through to get their road adopted into the county road system.
