Fiscal court discusses bad condition of roads Co. Judge expects 25 roads to be repaved or patched

Roads were not on the agenda at Monday's fiscal court meeting, but they were discussed anyway.

In his monthly address, Judge/Executive Kevin Williams said county flex road money was going to be used to repave or repair 25 roads in Estill County. He expects this may happen in the next couple of months.

"We'll eventually see some blacktop in this county," stated Williams.

He added a delay in the state releasing the flex money had come from changes in personnel at the state level.

Rhonda Childers asked about what was being done to repair a break-in pavement on Red Lick Road.

The fiscal court discussed it and breaks on Highway 89, although they are state maintained roads.

Williams said repairing a road slip is a lengthy process because FEMA looks at each one.

"There's still more slips

happening because of the weather," he stated.

He added that funding for Highway 89 is now in the state's six-year transportation plan. Williams mentioned there are so many wrecks on Highways 89 and 82.

Williams said the county has applied for a grant to install a ramp at the park.

He mentioned that Deputy Commissioner Regina Stivers was in Estill County on Thursday and looked over local tourist spots. She also visited Kicking It On The Creek on Rosses Creek.

Williams plans to have to have a fall clean up day, if county has tonnage left at the landfill. If so, there will be no trucks as in the spring cleanup, and residents must

haul their garbage to the landfill.

The state will also be having a tire amnesty October 18-20. Rules for tire disposals will be given out at a later date.

County Attorney Rodney Davis said that Birch Communications has been refunding their local customers for 911 fees.

He added that sometimes a phone was in the name of a now deceased husband. He said those widows must contact Birch Communications for a refund.

He said the opium lawsuit which the county has joined in was filed in Fayette District Court, but he expects it to be transferred to Cleveland Federal District Court.

Estill man charged with burglaries in county and Irvine

An Estill County man was arrested Sept. 13 and charged by two police agencies with two separate burglaries.

KSP Trooper Ty Robinson wrote in a citation that he took a burglary complaint at 100 JR Furniture Road, Irvine.

The citation states that a woman at the residence identified Casey Myers, 31, of 300 JR Furniture Road as the man who walked up to their front door and proceeded into their garage/outbuilding.

According to the citation, a female went outside to ask Myers what he was doing and saw him climb out of the garage window and run into the woods. No items were believed to have been taken.

Trooper Robinson charged Myers with third degree burglary and persistent felony offender.

While investigating the burglaries, the trooper was checking Leads Online on Sept. 12 for items related to burglaries be-

ing investigated by himself and the Irvine Police Department. Trooper Robinson discovered that Myers had pawned a pink .22 caliber rifle to Estill Gun & Pawn.

The trooper says he went to the pawn shop and took the rifle, Myers' identification card, and the pawn ticket. Estill Gun and Pawn will seek to recover the \$40 the gun was pawned for.

In connection with the pink rifle, Myers was charged Sept. 13 with theft by deception and possession of a firearm by a convicted felon.

On Sept. 5, the Irvine Police Department says that Myers was captured on a surveillance camera taking a weed eater and battery charger from a garage area on Woodspoint Drive in Irvine.

The citation by Officer Colton Lewis says that Myers was identified in the video by a tattoo on his neck.

Man arrested for selling drugs to IPD's confidential informant

The Irvine Police Department continues their crackdown on suspected drug dealers. They made two arrests on West Cedar Grove on Sept. 13.

Donald Ray Hardy, 65, was arrested at his residence and charged with two counts of trafficking in a controlled substance, first degree and second offense.

One citation says that Hardy sold five hydrocodone (Lortab) to a confidential informant on July 20 and received \$50 cash. The second citation states that he sold a confidential informant four hydrocodone for \$40 on August 8.

When Hardy was arrested, IPD confiscated \$83 in cash. The police department will seek forfeiture of the cash.

Hardy was arraigned in Estill District Court on Sept. 14 where he pleaded not-guilty.

Hardy plans to hire his own attorney. He waived his right to a preliminary hearing within tens of the arraignment. Judge William Leach set a date of Sept. 24 for Hardy's preliminary hearing.

Hardy was arrested by Sgt. John Stumliolo. When officers arrived to arrest Hardy, there was a black Ford pickup parked

in front of his residence. There were two occupants in the truck.

A citation states the officers noticed a woman in the truck trying to hide something.

Irvine's K-9 Fritz was delayed and alerted on the vehicle.

The officers found a small bag with three pills, which were identified as the hydrocodone. A woman said they were her pills.

Police Chief Brad Smith charged Jeanene Nicole Underwood, 32, with possession of a controlled substance, first degree.

She was arraigned Sept. 14 and pled not-guilty.
