Living Archaeology Weekend 2018 Teaching others about the past and inspiring stewardship

The Daniel Boone National Forest and its partners are proud to announce that the 30th annual Living Archaeology Weekend will once again be held in the scenic Red River Gorge. This unique event brings skilled artisans to the location where ancient Native Americans and early settlers once made their home.

Set alongside the Red River and the historic Gladie Cabin, the artisans will demonstrate the essential skills that people needed to live within this region's rugged landscape.

For more than 50 years, archaeological studies have been conducted in the Red River Gorge. The exhibits and materials presented at the event are based on research and archaeological discoveries found here.

The event participants will see flint knapping, hide tanning and spear throwing with tools modeled after those found by archaeologists. Visitors will observe the making of string, or cordage, by a specialist who has studied ancient textiles from the gorge. Other demonstrations include the making of ceramic pottery in the style of the local area; weaving cane baskets, modeled after actual recovered fragments: and cooking of local wild

On Friday, September 21 the program demonstrations are for preregistered school groups only, primarily targeting fifth grade curriculum.

"About 1,000 students from local schools are scheduled to attend," said Adams. "Because they get to participate in hands-on activities, we always have a high demand for students to attend the event.

The Living Archaeology Weekend is open to the general public on Saturday, September 22 from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Admission is free. Concessions will be available for purchase from the American Veterans Post 67 from Clay City.
