Can you all believe we're already getting to the end of September?! I sure can't. Here are the latest happenings at the Estill County Public Library:

For the adults, the first Crafternoon session was held on Wednesday, Sept. 10th with Vicki Horn here to demonstrate how to make excellent chocolate no-bake cookies. Participants said that the program was informative and fun, and the cookies were yummy - they never thought of cooking no-bake cookies in a cast iron skillet! I hope all who wanted to attend got to do so! The next Crafternoon session will be here at the library on Wednesday, Sept. 26th at 1:30p.m. and it will be an Art class with Sandy Savage. The second program in our Small Business Series happened on Friday, Sept. 14th. Amy Williams from the Mountain Association for Community Economic Development (MACED) Incorporation was here to discuss the pros and cons of getting started in a small business and the economic value of owning/operating a small business. One interesting statistic that Amy shared was that when you spend \$100 at a small business, \$48 of that will go back into the local community; whereas, if you spend \$100 online only \$1 of that is invested back into the community. To me, it puts in perspective just how important it is to shop locally as much as possible! Our Pickin' in the Park series are continuing to go great! After her, we will have Jack Smith performing on Tuesday, Oct. 2nd at 6:30p.m. We hope you all can make it out!

The Adult Book Club's next meeting will be on Tuesday, October 2nd at 1:30pm. The club is currently reading The Guinea Pig Diaries by A.J. Jacobs. All of the books are available in large print and audiobook format, and they are ready to be picked up anytime here at the library! As previously mentioned, the Adult Book club meets on the first Tuesday of each month at 1:30pm here at the library and they are always looking for new members to join! A new program that we will be starting up in October is our Haunted House series! This will be a series of programs to get tips on how to research the history of your older home (or building) using primary resources and public records. Participants will be learning about, and using, resources from the library, the Court House, and the Estill County Historical and Genealogical Society Museum. So if you are curious about learning more about the history of your home, or a particular building, this would be a great program for you! The first session will be on Friday, Oct. 5th at 12:00p.m. and we will offer it again that evening at 5:00p.m. If you want more information, just give us a call!

Starting in October, we will begin the November Election candidate forums also! These forums are a great opportunity to get out and learn more about what each candidate has to offer in a fair and unbiased environment. The first forum will be held for the candidates of Mayor and City Council, it will be in the evening on Monday, Oct. 1st. Moving on to our teen programs, the Young Adult Book Club started up on Sept. 10th and they had a great time getting acquainted and introduced to the book for the month, which is The Invention of Hugo Cabret by Brian Selznick. This book can still be picked up here at the library anytime! Their next meeting will be on Monday, Sept. 24th at 4:00p.m. Any middle or high school aged teens are still welcome to join in!

The next Teen Game Night will be on Tuesday, Sept. 25th at 3:30p.m. and the next Anime Club meeting will be on Friday, Sept. 21st at 3:30p.m. Both of these are open to all middle and high school aged teenagers! These are great opportunities for them to get together and have some fun outside of school.

For our kiddos, our Storytime programs are continuing to grow! The Wednesday programs are still focused on the alphabet and in the next couple of weeks they will be learning about E, F, and G; they will also be starting to learn color names! Wednesday Storytime happens every Wednesday at 10:30a.m. Also, just a reminder, Nighttime Storytime has started and any children ages 0-5 (and older siblings) are welcome to attend! They will be meeting every Thursday evening at 5:30p.m.; however, there will NOT be a Nighttime Storytime this Thursday, Sept. 20th. Next week it will resume as normal.

The Baby and Me Storytime sessions have been having great attendance as well! Last week there were 10 babies and toddlers in attendance. They played with our new scarves, read a few books and got out the parachute to play with! The Baby and Me Storytime sessions are every Friday at 10:30a.m.; however, there will NOT be a session on this Friday, Sept. 21st. It will resume on Sept. 28th though.

Lego Club was a blast last week, so I hear! They had 16 kids that came out to build! They made all kinds of different creations from castles to space battles, all of which are on display here at the front of the library. Just a reminder, Lego Club is every Thursday at 4:15p.m., but there will NOT be Lego Club this Thursday, Sept. 20th. It will resume next week as well.

The Homeschool Program started last week and there were 16 kids in attendance! They did a few get-to-know-you activities, as well as plan for the future. Nelle Williams will be at the next meeting on Thursday, Sept. 27th to share about Martha Washington and the Constitution. This program is open to all homeschoolers and occurs every 2nd and 4th Thursday of each month at 1:00p.m. here at the library.

Our top ten book recommendations of the week come from my fellow Library Aide, Katelyn Fowler! Her top ten favorite books are as follows: The Lunar Chronicles by Marissa Meyer, Warbreaker by Brandon Sanderson, The Lord of the Rings by J.R.R. Tolkien, Timeless Fairy Tales by K.M. Shea, The Stormlight Archive by Brandon Sanderson, The Lady Janies series by Bodie Ashton, Cynthia Hand, and Jodi Meadows, Anne of Green Gables by L.M. Montgomery, Before She Ignites by Jodi Meadows, An Ember in the Ashes by Sabaa Tahir, and The Incorrigible Children of Aston Place by Maryrose Wood. These books will be on display at the front of the library for anyone who is interested in checking them out!

Recently we have had to complete our Annual Report for the 2017-2018 fiscal year, which is where we add up how many people have used the library and our many resources that we have available to the community. I'd like to share some of those statistics we have gathered from the past year, I think it shows just how much our library is utilized and how important it is for our community! In one year, we had 31,183 library visits and 15,401 bookmobile visits. We had 103,807 items (books, magazines, movies, audiobooks, games, etc.) be checked out, and 4,355 electronic items (e-books, streaming videos, audiobooks, etc.) be distributed to library card holders. Between the library and the bookmobile, we conducted 369 programs and had 9,967 people attend those programs. We also had 6,435 public internet computer uses and 8,269 wireless internet sessions. Together, that adds up to a lot of people getting great use of all we have to offer here at the Estill County Public Library - we are so very excited to be expanding with our impending move to Broadway next year and plan to offer much more to the community once we have more space! We would like to thank all of our patrons for being so devoted and encourage anyone who would like to get a library card to do so, we love seeing new faces!
