Susan Starling and Rebecca Wolfinbarger were selected for recognition by the EDA Board of Directors for their outstanding contributions to the community.

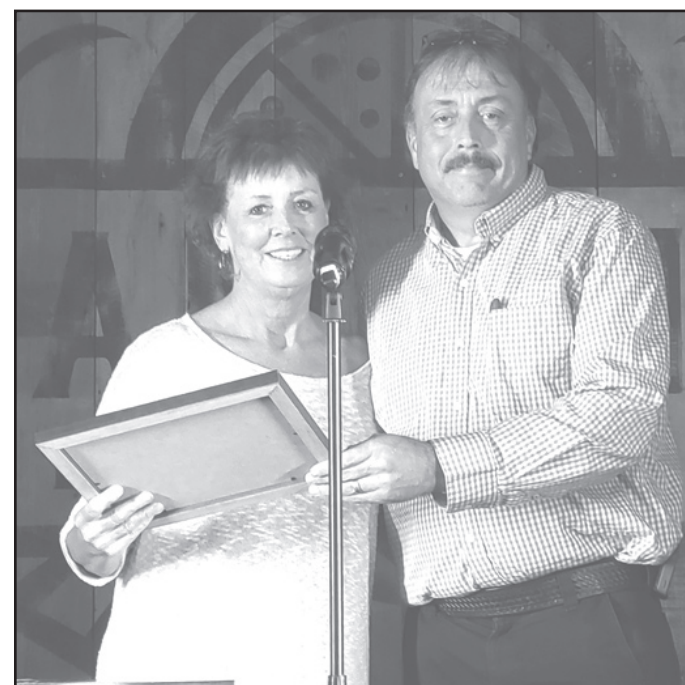
The mission of the Honorable Order of Estill County Captains is to recognize those who uphold the honor and tra-

Police Activity Report

Irvine Officer Jason Conrad served an arrest warrant October 27 on **Mistie Combs**, 44, of Hillsboro Heights, Irvine for failure to pay a fine of \$205.

Combs was found guilty in Lee District Court of two counts of promoting contraband in the first degree and third degree assault, inmate assault on correctional employee, on Jan. 10, 2018. Judge William Leach set her bail at \$205 cash.

Police Chief Brad Smith arrested **Stephany Louise Thompson**, 33, of Beattyville, on Oct. 22 on a charge of operating a motor vehicle under the influence of alcohol or drugs on Millers Creek Road.

Smith said he received a complaint of an intoxicated driver at Ravenna Food Mart. As he arrived there, he said the vehicle was pulling out. It drifted from side to side while traveling toward Millers Creek Road.

Chief Smith cited **Jessica M. Brandenburg**, 36, of North Plum Street, Irvine on Oct. 21 with violation of city ordinance 92.02 (nuisance conditions on private property).

The citation states the property has trash, clutter, and junk. Smith said he delivered a copy of the city's nuisance ordinance about a month ago, and the owner has failed to comply.

Smith arrested **Scott Cornett**, 52, of Lincoln Avenue, Irvine on Oct. 21 and charged him with receiving stolen property under \$500.

The police chief said he received a report of shoplifting from Madison County, and a description was given of a vehicle. Smith said he located the vehicle on River Drive and conducted a traffic stop.

Following a consented search, Smith said he located eight packs of bacon and five packs of ham at Cornett's feet. The value of the merchandise was listed under \$500, which was confirmed by the store's manager. Officer Conrad assisted with the investigation.

Maria Estes-Swinford, 41, of Turner Avenue was arrested October 25. by Officer Stuart Morris.

The citation states that woman was a pedestrian on Rosebud Ave. As Officer Morris passed by, he said she concealed her face to keep him from seeing her. Then she fell to the ground as he passed him.

She reportedly failed field sobriety tests. The citation states that police confiscated a crystal substance in a clear bag, a piece of paper folded up with a clear crystal substance, and a pipe with residue.

Gross asked for the council to approve the use of the cherry picker to assist Santa Claus when he makes his visit to Meade's Do It Center on November 30th. He said the gentleman will need help getting off the building and that he will be asked to sign a release form so the city is not responsible if an accident occurs.

The council discussed adding extra paid holidays for city employees. Currently employees receive eight paid holidays, and county employees receive 11 paid holidays. Gross said they would possibly be able to add the day after Thanksgiving and the day

after Christmas.

Councilman Woody Tipton suggested giving them their birthday as a paid holiday. The council decided to table the discussion until the next meeting.

Fire Chief Tony Murphy said the Irvine Fire Department had assisted in a fatal fire that had occurred on Covey Road a couple of weeks ago.

He also reported that the IFD has been denied an AFG grant that they had applied for so they would be looking at alternative ways to get new turnout gear for the firefighters.

The council moved into closed session to discuss pending litigation.

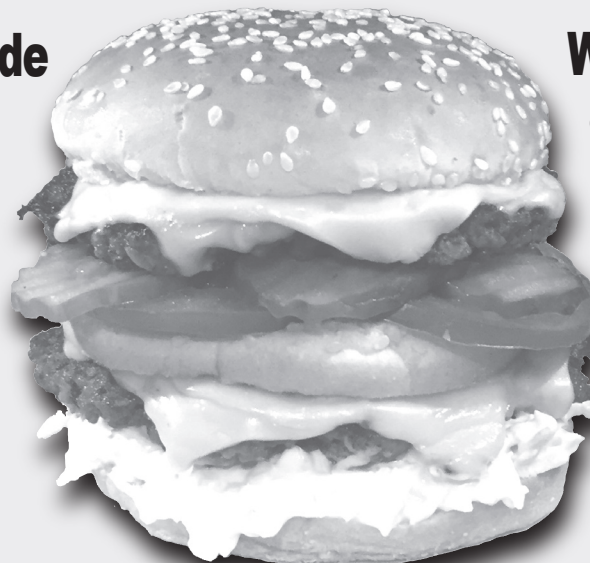
