Hunter, a full stock blood hound, was used by the Estill County Rescue Squad to search for missing persons.

His handler, David Conrad, let the animal out to use the bathroom in the Kissey Branch and Red Lick area on Sunday morning. The 18-month-old service canine never returned.

Search and rescue teams looked for Hunter for nearly 24 hours. His body was found.

An investigation was conducted by Kentucky State Police, which led to an arrest.

On Monday night, Trooper Casey Caudill arrested Charles Collins, 59.

Collins was charged with first degree assault on a service animal and second degree cruelty to animals.

He was lodged in the Three Forks Regional Jail.

fiscal courts hold meetings

The Estill Fiscal Court met twice in the last five days for special meetings.

Thursday's meeting was the last for the judge/executive, all magistrates, and the county attorney.

Monday's meeting was a standard procedure at the beginning of term for all county officials.

Judge/Executive Donnie Watson has served two terms in that position in the past.

He wants to keep the county moving forward and make it a better place to live. He also mentioned that providing jobs was a concern.

All department heads were reappointed, and county employees were rehired.

This has become a formality in Estill County, but in the past, when a new administration took over, it brought new employees.

Watson said the county finance officer is retiring but has agreed to stay for a month to train her replacement, Teressa Reeves. Reeves has already been working in occupational tax collections.

The fiscal court approved the payment for re-occurring expenses, such as payroll and utility bills.

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Saylor went on to say that he would get board members a booklet on the open meetings law and they would also review the strategic plan that was developed in 2016 for the school district.

Saylor informed the board that grades 7-12 would soon have their own personal computer device. He said that they would come equipped with a program that would allow monitoring on all devices at all times.

On January 2nd the Estill County High School announced the hiring of Jordan Marcum as the head football coach. Principal Chris Winkler stated that it had been an extensive search and that the screening committee had reviewed over twenty applications before making the decision to hire Marcum. Winkler added that the committee was impressed with the work that Marcum has done at two other schools and feels like he will lead this program to success.

Marcum is a native of Bell County where he attended high school. He then attended Eastern Kentucky University where he graduated with a Bachelor of Science – Business Marketing Education. He went on to receive a Master of Arts, Math 5-9, and LBD K-12 from Union College and is currently taking classes

through the University of the Cumberlands.

Marcum's coaching background includes the offensive and defensive cooridinator at Jackson County High School, defensive cooridinator at East Jessamine High School, and defensive back coach/return game at Madison Central High School. He was also the head track coach while at East Jessamine and stated on his resume that the track team had only twenty five members when he started coaching and has grown to more than sixty members. Marcum plans to be involved with the track team at the Estill County High School as well.

Marcum stated that he felt like the Lord had guided him in this direction, to a school so full of tradition and pride and that it's an honor and a blessing to be an Engineer. Marcum will be teaching Freshman Geometry at the Estill County High School.
