The band turned in another strong preliminary performance and received best Color Guard, and 1st place in class AA, beating Garrard County for the second straight week.

After advancing to finals, the band had their best performance yet and finished in second place overall out of a fifteen band field. The scores later revealed that they were only 1.3 points away from Grand Champions Madison Central.

Madison Central has been one of the strongest bands in the state over the years in their respective class while Estill County has continued to be at the top of their class for several years. One year, both the Central and Estill bands won the state in their respective classes.

The Marching Engineers then honed up their skills on the practice field in preparation for competition at Pulaski County in Somerset against some west-central bands. Estill would be competing in Class AAA against Wayne County, Marion County, and Glasgow. Two 4A bands, Southwestern and Barren County, were also be competing. Somerset, Danville, and Harlan will be competing in Class A, while Knox Central was the only 2A band scheduled.

The Estill County Marching Engineers Band made their inaugural journey to Johnson City, Tennessee and competed in the Bands of America Regional Championship. The band was in a field of 33 total bands from 9 different states in this national regional competition.

After an unbelievable preliminary performance in the "Mini Dome" at East Tennessee State University, it was announced that Estill had won Best Music in class A, Best Visual in class A, and Best Overall Effect in Class A. When the rankings were announced, Estill learned that they were 1st place in class A, and had earned the title of Bands of America Class A Regional Champions! The top 10 highest scoring bands would advance to finals, and Estill's score was high enough to qualify.

Then the Marching Engineers made the short trip to Winchester to compete in the KMEA East Region Quarterfinals. This regional is not like the sports region which consists of the schools in the 14th. KMEA basically divides the state in half with all east bands in each class competing in the East Region Quarterfinal, and all west bands in each class competing in the West Region Quarterfinal. Eight bands from the east, and eight bands from the west advance to form the "sweet sixteen".

Estill performed in the last spot on the night and they did not disappoint. The band turned in a stellar performance which earned them their sixth East Regional Championship! Not only were the Marching Engineers named Regional Champions, they also received an overall score of 92, which is the highest total ever received in the history of the program.

The Marching Engineers competed in the KMEA State Marching Band Championships in Bowling Green. The band first performed in State Semifinals at Warren Central High School with the other 15 bands who advanced from Quarterfinals. After an extremely courageous performance through high winds, the band learned that they had the overall highest score of the 16 bands in Semifinals. This again earned them a spot in State Finals (the final four) which were held Saturday evening at WKU. Estill's finals performance was simply stunning. All of the countless hours of hard work finally paid off with a nearly flawless run, and a standing ovation from the entire stadium. But, by the narrowest of margins, the band was awarded 2nd place with a score of 88.9. Rival Adair County was named State Champions with a score of 89.0. This was Estill's 6th State Finals ap-


19th Birthday Party
