Deputy locates a large quantity of meth, arrests two

The Estill County Sheriff's Department reports that two Irvine men were arrested early Monday, and a large quantity of methamphetamine was confiscated.

Deputy Chris Coffey said he observed a 2004 Chevy pass him on the Richmond Road around 3:18 a.m. as he was pulling out of Save-A-Lot parking lot.

He added the rear license plate was not illuminated so he attempted to make a traffic stop on it.

He said the vehicle continued on until it finally pulled over at Stop and Shop. Coffey said he and Irvine Officer Jason

Conrad could smell the odor of marijuana coming from the vehicle. A search was made upon the vehicle.

The driver, Charles J. Nutter, 40, of Hood Avenue, told the officers that a black back pack was his. It contained several needles, a scale, and lots of baggies.

Officer Conrad reported that he found an eye glass case in another back pack.

A search of the vehicle and the backpacks reportedly turned up 40.46 grams of methamphetamine. Nutter allegedly had \$46 in his possession.
